

Three years into its existence, the Farmington/Farmington Hills Multicultural/Multiracial Community Council has seen its share of unsung heroes.

Now the council wants to honor them.

The first-ever Rainbow Recognition Awards Breakfast will take place at 7:30 a.m. Tuesday, Jan. 16, at the Farmington Hills Activ-

ities Center, 2860 W. 11 Mile Road, east of Middlebelt. Tickets are \$6, which includes a breakfast buffet.

The Rev. Nicholas Hood, minister of the Plymouth Congregational Church and Detroit city councilman, will be the guest speaker.

Awards will be presented to community people who have promoted multiculturalism.

"We believe there are a number

of recognizable as well as unsung heroes in our community, doing things and who go unrecognized in promoting diversity," said Oakland Community College President and council member George Keith. "We felt it was the appropriate time — in a modest way — to have those people identified."

Since its inception in 1993, the community council has hosted monthly forums. Richard Leben-

thal will be the guest speaker at the next forum Tuesday, Dec. 12, at the Farmington Training Center.
