Farmington's post office might be filing a change of eddress card soon. The United States Postal Service is

will open what is being termed a "fu-ture" store in the Downtown Center. The outlet will occupy 4,000 square feet in the main portion of the center, which used to house Shoe Town.

The opening of a smaller retail operation could mean the closing of the Slocum Street facility. Farmington City Managor Frank Lauboff said he met with postal officiols from Chicago a week ago.

"They do plan to vacate that building in one to two years," Lauhoff said. "It's too small. They really want to build in Farmington, but there is

nothing available."
Postal officials were retuctant to confirm any move because the lease has not been signed yet.

"We're still negotiating," said Bob Borne, a U.S. Postal facilities service manager. "It's a little bit premature."

As for the Slocum Street outlet, Borne said, "We want to do something sles with that to move the carriage out of there. We don't have a plan for that as yet."
