# Official leaves conservation legacy

The tragic news swept through the outdoor community like a wildlife out of control. Thomas L Washington, long-time seccutive director of the Michigan United Conservation Clubs and president of the National Rifle Association, passed away Tuesday of complications following a heart attack..."It's a tremendous loss to the entire state because Tom was one of the prested conservation leaders we've ever heaf," said MUCC president Art Dittmar, of Farmington Hills. "It's a loss not just to the state, but to the entire nation because of his work with the NRA and the National Wildlife Federation.

"But his legacy will continue," added Dittmar. "This is a very, very strong organization he has built in MUCC, and we will continue to carry the fight for natural resources in the state. And his legacy will live on in the Natural Resource Trust Fund as well, which was his brainchild. He was the chairman of that, and it will continue into the future."

According to Dittmar, Washington, 55 and the father of six, hunted on November 15, opening day of the Michigan firearms deer season, near his cabin in the Upper Peninsula. He wasn't feeling well when he awoke on the 16th and was later flown to the Oakwood Medical Center in Dearborn after suffering a heart attack. He

He . rose through the ranks and became executive director and publisher in 1974. He held those positions until his death. He . was honored for his conservation efforts by many groups including Safari Club International: and the Michigan Duck Huntors Association. He was instrumental in getting the was instrumental in getting the bettle Bill plassed, which brought forth refunds on beverage bottles. He co-signed the Tribal Fishing Agreement, worked on the multillion dollar Luddington Fump Storago Settlement, the Firearms Preemption Act, the State Park Endowment Fund and the Shooting Range Protection Act, the was also a strong supporter of MUCC's statewide education programs.

"MUCC's motto is: Conserva-tion through Education. That was Tom's big push," added Dittmar. "He felt if we could educate poo-ple about the wise use of our nat-ural resources that they would support conservation."

Rick Jamison was appointed acting executive director of MUCC. He will carry on in that capacity until the executive com-mittee hires a new director.
