Church has new home

Nëstled far from the beaten
path, steeple pointing heavenward, white trim and red brick
crisp in the setting sun, the new
North Congregational Church on
12 Mile Road in Farmington Hills
is the perfect Christmas-card picture of a New England church.

"They say z-chitecture is not
going to be that which gets people
to church, but i beilieve architecture is going to open the door,"
admitted the Reverend Dr. Mark
Jensen, pastor of North Congregational Church.

"Once people are in the door,"
we have to make them feel
that worship is meaningful, that
they can grow spiritually and that
have is a community for them."

The's just what Jensen has
been doing for his congregations
for more than 20 years. He served
as a pastor in Baston for seven
before coming to North
Congregational 16 years ago when
the church was located at Lahner
and Northwestern Highway in
Southfield.

With roots in the Detroit area since 1866, North Congregational constructed it's first building around 1910 on Woodward Avenue. The Southfield church broke ground on the first Sunday in October 1954 and held their first service on the first Sunday in December 1955.

Ironically, ground was broken exactly 40 years later, on the first Sunday in October 1994, for the new Farmington Hills church while the first service at the new houch was held one week earlier, the last Sunday in November, 1905.

In deciding to build in Farmington Hills, Jensen pointed out, "We looked at the churches that were already here because we simply didn't want to just duplicate. We looked at the community and make-up and it would seem that the people in the Farmington Hills - West Bloomfield area would be people who would likely be, potential members of our church."

The quaint new church building was designed by the architectural firm of Merritt, McCallum and Cleslak. The Federal design is reminiscent of New England churches, complete with two stopics of shuttered windows, closed porch and pilasters in the front instead of colonial-type columns. Inside, gleaming white rails grace the attairways to the surrounding balcony as well as the short stairway leading to the puipit.
While the design and decorbods well of colonial times, the efficient catering kitchen, silding room walls and state-of-the- art Soo-pipe organ with digital capabilities are pertainly indicative of the approaching twenty-first century.

Speaking of the organ from the R.A. Colby company in Tennessee, Jensen said, 'that the capability of practically playing itself.'

Jensen has been attending meetings of the Farmington Ministerial Association for over a year now since his congregation was temporarily housed at the Mercy Center on Middlebelt for 14 months during the church's construction.

"The sisters of Mercy were good to us," he said.




