made up in a more well-rounded academic experience, officials said. The 1,034 instructional hours projected falls within state mandates.

Nonetheless, teachers will have to narrow what they discuss, officials said.

SMART allows more academic freedom, allowing students to sign in and then proceed to another area to work. They'll also have to report back at the end of the period.

SMART will be a graduate requirement.

"Our students are highly creative," Trustee Joe Svoke said. "There are some challenges there."

Overall, though, school officials believe students will be challenged academically. They'll have to take seven subjects in a semester instead of six.

Freshman will have more options, Barrett said. By taking all their required classes, there is little time for electives.

For instance, a freshman in band would also be able to take a foreign language or computer class.

Farmington High staff visited Birmingham Groves and Monroe High, which have similar scheduling.

Monroe High students and parents are expected to meet with Farmington High's to discuss the effects of block scheduling. Monroe High is in its second year with block scheduling, though the school principal has worked with it since 1989 in Texas.

plating this to make sure they get together and talk about what their priorities and needs are," said Monroe High Principal Bill Martin.

"There's always bugs when you try to do something that's different to the traditional way... It's an evolving process."

Groves assistant principal Joan Burleigh said the format is challenging for teachers.

"If you lecture for 47 minutes, it's not going to work in 90 minutes," Burleigh said. "You have to go back and rethink how you deliver instruction."

The plan will cost \$545,000 to \$643,000 to implement, officials said.

At the Jan. 9 presentation, Farmington resident August Blomquist also wanted to know

another bottom line: How much will students improve academically?

He cited the MEAP tests in particular.

"They might go up a point if you simply turn the lights up," Blomquist said. "Could you quantify (how much they'll improve)?"

Tests scores might not improve significantly, "but we're not just looking at a one day, one shot test," Farmington High Principal Jim Meyers said.

Trustee Dave York said taxpayers need to see something, though.

"If the MEAP isn't something you're going to hang your hat on, come back showing us something else... that learning is improving," York said.
