The DNR is adding an experimental fourth hunting period this spring to ensure that all hunters who apply for a license will have an opportunity to hunt. The overall season has been extended from 35 to 40 days and divided into four hunt periods instead of three. Licenses for the fourth hunt period, May 21-31, will be valid in all apring wild turkey units except

public lands in Zone III. Some of the other hunts have been shortened slightly to accommodate the fourth hunt.

Hunters must select Hunt Number 210 as one of their three hunt choices to be eligible for the experimental fourth hunt. Applicants will receive the fourth hunt only if their preferred hunt choices are full. Every hunter who esicets Hunt Number 210 is guaranteed a license. There are no guarantees on any of the other hunts.

Creating an opportunity
"Last year about 25,000 hunters didn't got a license," explained Urbain. "The general idea is to satisfy people who want to go turkey hunting. We looked at a lot of things, including a preferance system, and decided this was the best. One of the Turkey Federation chapters near Gaylord came up with this proposal. We worked with them on it and came up with the fourth hunt period."

Hopes are this experimental hunt will pacify those hunters who have failed to draw a permit in recent years, but there are some draw backs. The fourth hunt is at the end of the traditional season and mosquitoes and black files are active by then. Follage is also heavier than during the early hunts as the spring bloom is well under way. Another concern is the fact that after 30

days of being hunted the birds are aure to be gun-shy and call-wary. Despite these negatives, a license for the fourth hunt is better than sitting home disappointed be-cause you didn't even get an op-portunity. Urbain doesn't feel the fourth hunt will have an adverse affect on the flock.

"By the end of May breeding has taken place," explained Urbain. "The hens will pull off a batch even if there are no Toma around. The flock has increased and continues to increase and I think we can give bunters an opportunity to hunt without hurting the flock."

The popularity of spring turkey hunting, as well as the size of the flock, has exploded in the past 10 years. In 1985, the DNR received 22,680 applications for 16,010 spring turkey lineases. Lat year, 18,300 hunters applied for 54,783 licenses. The flock has also grown tremendously. There were approximately 12,000 birds in 1985 compared to 86,000 last year. There are now wild turkeys in 76 of Michigan's 82 counties.

Although the number of permits issued has risen along with the growth of the flock, the opportunities have fallen short of the demand. The experimental season should increase these opportunities.
