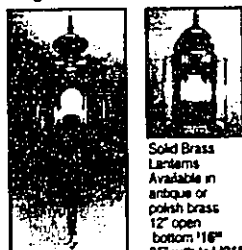

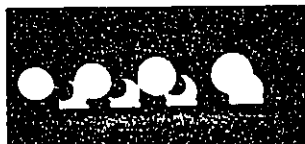

WJR, they have allowed me to continue on his station this past year. It was on this station some 8 years ago that I met Fat Bob Taylor, the singing plumber.

He informed me that 33 family members were coming to his house for Thanksgiving dinner, and that the bake element in his electric stove had blown up and the service company couldn't get one for two weeks.

The next day I replaced the element in his stove and he never forgot that small favor. A great friendship developed between us and I miss him so very much since his passing this past Father's Day.

I'm not alone, but I may be the only man who cries when he hears his music.

Aside from not making any money the first ten years of this period, some very good things have happened to this lonely repairman.

Glenn Haego urged me to write a book which has proven very successful and as a result I did 53 shows on different stations across the country.

Fat Bob Taylor had me on his show on WJR many times during 1994 and it prompted management to look at what I was doing. I was signed to do my own show at the beginning of '95 and according to a recent meeting, it looks like I am going to be on 760 WJR for some time to come.

And, guess what folks? I am being paid.

A personal point of view before you ask me what it is like to be a celebrity on a major radio station in Detroit. I AM NOT A CELEBRITY. . . . I am a blue collar worker with 30 years of experience in appliance service blessed with a God-given gift of gab.

I love giving of my knowledge to others so that they can save money and do it themselves.

To be able to do a radio program on what I call the biggest radio station in the world, and to write a column for what I call the biggest little newspaper in the world, is very rewarding to this individual.

Think of all the people that I touch with my information and all the good it does and I remind you of what Rev. Gero once said in his sermon, "There is no happier person than one who is serving others."
