She identified her attacker in the courtroom.

Defense attorney Elias Escobedo asked how she was able to identify Bartok since the man who attacked her was wearing a mask.

The parking lot was well-lit and she could make out his face through the nylon, she testified. He also smelled of cigarette smoke.

"And number three, I was right in front of his face," she said.

After sexually assaulting her, the man dragged her behind a semi-tractor trailer. The attack fled after the girl's mother ran screaming to the parking lot.

The girl sat with her mother and family waiting for the exam to begin. Due to a mix-up, the defendant wasn't transported to the court house until 1:30 p.m.

After several more delays, the exam started at 4 p.m.

Bartok told Judge Maria Parker he wanted his attorney present. Attorney Amy Hopp was filling in for Bartok's court-appointed attorney Elias Escobedo, who was in Oakland County Circuit Court.

Hopp asked that the competency hearing and exam be delayed, saying she was not familiar with the case.

"I want my attorney," Bartok said repeatedly.

Said Judge Parker: "You have an attorney sitting right next to you."

Parker ruled Bartok was competent to stand trial based on a report from the Forensic Center. Escobedo was called an asked to come in to represent Bartok.

PUT GRINDING TO A HALT

While everyone grinds his or her teeth at night occasionally, it is estimated that 20 percent of the population grinds its teeth to the point of causing tooth damage. Bruxism (tooth grinding) is responsible for tooth-damaging pressures of 250 pounds per square inch, which is ten times more than the force exerted during normal chewing. To make matters worse, nocturnal tooth grinding wears the teeth at an accelerated rate. As a result, the most teeth can be worn down significantly, and the risk of tooth loss increases. Grinding can also cause a variety of other problems, including headaches, muscle tension, and temporomandibular joint (TMJ) disorders. While the root cause of bruxism is likely to be stress, the dentist can prescribe a protective nightguard to safeguard the teeth from the wear and tear of grinding.

SHOULDER PAIN

Most shoulder pain does not result from arthritis. If you hurt in the shoulder and want a quick test of the etiology of the joint, do the following:

1. If you can do both of the above, even with difficulty, then your shoulder joint is intact, your problem is not arthritis.

2. The most common cause is tendinitis, what most people call bursitis. In the past you suffered an injury to the tendon that raises the arm-the supraspinatus tendon. Healing was incomplete. Years later, by accumulated wear and tear, the tendon frays again, the pain ensues.

Rest alone may suffice for repair; often heat helps accelerate resolution of the injury.

If these measures do not work, then see your doctor. Either by physical therapy, medication or injection, you can expect resolution of the tendon so you can sleep at night and work during the day without shoulder pain.
