Zoning change clears way for Hills' 'upscale eatery'

The Farmington Hills City Council paved the way for a new upscale restaurant with initial approval of a zoning change at the Jan. 15 regular meeting.

Arie Leibovitz, of Air-El Enterprises, Inc. made his second proposal for a restaurant at the site of a former bank building on Grand River next to the Bill Knapp's restaurant.

An earlier proposal by Leibovitz,
for Novi Partners Limited Partnership, was rejected by the council members approved that
the restaurant proposal will still face serving over a site plan
and other considerations.
The planning commission decided it was reasonable to
tase, said Claude Contes, the

activ of 80,000 people, only has
two existing upscale restaurants.
There are very few things
that could be done with the
building, other than build a
restaurant, Leibovitz said.

Councilman Jon Grant, who had voted against the change initially, said he liked finding a "compatible" use for the property with the surrounding area that preserved the building.

Councilwoman Vicki Barnett cited support for the project from residents and businesses in the area. And Councilwoman Massie Kurzeja saw a restaurant as a good use of the property.

"I don't believe there will be a domino effect," she said. "Mr. Leibovitz is apanding up to \$400,000 on this. Farmington Hills has effice buildings at this time sitting empty."

But Councilmembers Cheryl Oliverio and Terry Sever voted against the proposal.
Oliverio said although she thought the proporty would make a fine restaurant but the zoning change would add more "spot zoning" to the community. "In the city's redevolopment stage, we have to resist the desire to change land use because of a particular use," Sever said. "This is just the beginning of what we're probably going to see in the future. There are not to

many requests for up zoning because that raises taxes.

In other action, the council:

Agreed to have a public hearing in March on enforcing the city's Dumpster Enclosure Ordinance.

Heard a presentation of the city's road and highway construction projects for the coming year. Those projects include the 13 Mile Road and Middlebelt intorsection that will cost the city \$259,000 out of the total \$1,133,000; the widening of Eight Mile from Farmington to Halsted to 5 lanes that will cost the city \$259,000, be preent of the total cost; the Haggerty Road Connector, with the remaining costs paid by the federal government and Novi; the M-5 and Grand River interchange, with the federal government picking up \$1.4 million; and the Northwestern Highway widening from 12 Mile to south of 14 Mile with Farmington Hills and Southfield splitting \$375,000 of the local share (2.5 percent) of the \$12 million project.
