Birmingham's historic train
station found a new life when it
was converted into a spectacular
restaurant — Norman's Eton
Street Station.

Always popular with singles (age range around 30 to 50), the restaurant has a main dining room joined by an area that seats 25 at a circular bar and has 20 more seats along the side wall and

The curved ceiling, painted terra-cotta when the train station was redone as a restaurant, has been re-painted within the last few months to a hoavenly perivaised blue, accented with gold. "That's Norman's decorating," said Bonnie LoPage, referring to her restaurateur husband. Besides Norman's Eton Street Station, the couple owns East Side Mario's in Rochester, Livonia and coming in April's Southfield and operates Mac and Ray's in Harrison Township.
