Malls say receipts-for-schools is a hit



Shoppers and students have embraced The Be True To Your School receipts campaign at three area mails. It looks like 3,100 schools will split a \$250,000 prize.

Lakeside, Twelve Oaks and Fair-lane Town Center remind shoppers that there are just two months left to have their purchases credited towards learning materials for their favorite school.

learning materials for their tavorrie school. The seven-month "Be True To Your School" program ends March 31. Shoppers stop at strategically placed schoolhouse booths through-out the centers where mail staff cred-its their purchase receipts to a run-

ning tab for the school of their choice.
The schools can use the credits to buy videos, videodisse, computer software, books and other reference materials of their choice.
"Nearly 3,100 Michigan schools are logged into the program," said Ava Demonja, Fairlane's marketing director. "Credits to schools since the program began total more than \$200,000. The centers hope to reach \$250,000 and she believes the goal will be surpassed.

will be surpassed.
Credits to the schools during the

recent holiday season totaled over \$160,000 according to Elaine Kah, Twelvo Oaks marketing director.

"We had a great holiday, and people were very conscientious about crediting their purchases to their schools," as easil. "The schools are going to be really pleased when they see how much the holidays boosted their credita."

Receipts can be credited for anything from suits to suiteness and computers to cappuccino. Any Michigan public or private school, grades K-12, is eligible.

The program began August 21 and mall insiders say it may be repeated in the fall due to all the support from area schools as well as shoppers. PTAs have touted the program in

their monthly newsletters and princi-pals eagerly await the credits to sup-plement learning materials.

All receipts must be dated August 21, 1995 through March 31, 1996, but customers who are pressed for time may pick up special "Be True To Your School" receipt holders at the schoolhouse booths. They can use them to save their seles slips and turn them in at a more convenient time before March 31.

Schools receive a monthly tally of their credits. When the program closes, each school will use its credits to order directly from some of the country's largest and best-respected school/library suppliers, including National Geographic, PBS Video and Pollett Library.
