

## POLICE/FIRE CALLS

Listed below are some of the Farmington-area police incidents, fire calls and court cases reported during the past week.

## ■ FIRE DEPARTMENT CALLS

## ■ STOPPED BREATHING

Farmington Hills firefighters from Station 3 answered a call for a 14-month-old baby that was not breathing at a residence on Auburn in Farmington Hills at 3:13 p.m. Feb. 10. Hills police transported the baby with firefighter Charles Dexter working to revive the child. The baby gave a cry on the way to Botsford General Hospital. The baby was treated and released.

## ■ ASSAULT

A Farmington Hills boy, 11, told Hills police that another boy, 13, who had been expelled from East Middle School on Middlebelt, attacked him near the school at 2:30 p.m. Feb. 7, pushing him and kicking him.

## City fills vacancies on boards, commissions

Shiawassee Street resident Walt Gajewski has been appointed to a three-year term on the 1996 Beautification Commission.

He fills one of several vacancies on Farmington boards and commissions. Gajewski's term expires December 1998.

Farmington City Council approved his appointment as well as several reappointments at Monday's meeting.

Several existing board members will continue to serve. They include:

■ William Ingalls' term on the Farmington Building Authority has been extended until Jan. 1999.

■ Kenneth Wallace and Robert Allen have been reappointed to the Construction Board of Appeals. Their new terms expire Feb. 5, 1998. Farmington Hills fire Lt. and Farmington resident Michael Garr will not continue after his term expires Feb. 5. Garr has recommended a replacement with a similar background in fire inspection, city officials said.

■ Nadine Rafferty and Robert

Fitzpatrick have been reappointed to the Downtown Development Authority. Rafferty's new term expires in 1998; Fitzpatrick's 1999.

City Council also accepted the resignation of Beautification Member Marisa Miller, who is stepping down due to family and professional commitments. Miller

played a large role in the commission-sponsored study of the Grand River corridor by Lawrence Institute of Technology architectural students last year.

Miller has offered to help on any short-term projects. "That's great she'll stay on as a friend," Mayor Jo Anne McShane said.

## Lottery set at Highmeadow

A lottery to select students for grades 1-5 for Highmeadow Common Campus will take place Monday, March 13.

The lottery will fill openings for the 1996-97 school year. Enrollment at the school is by lottery only.

In order for a student to be eli-

gible, a parent or guardian must register the child at the school during the week of March 4.

Highmeadow is in Holly Hills subdivision, which is north of 12 Mile Road, between Orchard Lake and Middlebelt roads. The school will accept applications between 10 a.m. to 3:45 p.m. March 4-8.

On Monday, March 4, registration hours will be extended until 7 p.m. followed by an overview of the Highmeadow program presented by principal Barbara Reams and staff.

Highmeadow was named a National Exemplary School in 1994 and continually posts the highest scores on the Michigan Educational Assessment Tests in the district.
