involved in promotions to benefit its members, which includes merchants and service oriented businesses.

"The DDA's job is to promote the city," Touch of Romance owner Bev Brown said. "The DFBA's job is to promote the businesses."

A viable DFBA coincides with an overall rejuvenation of downtown. DDA executive director Judy Downey said.

"Like anything else you need to have an influx of new blood and new ideas to keep things going," said Downey, who is excited about the DFBA's turnaround.

or six people were keeping the DFBA alive in the lean years.

"In effect, there were five or six of us," said Civic Theatre owner Greg Huhler, who is involved with the DDA and DFBA. "After awhile when you're not getting any support or new ideas... you say it's not worth hitting my head against the wall."

DFBA's renewal is not an indi-

cation the DDA has failed business owners, Kanyo said. "The DDA has done their job," Kanyo said. "I've heard a lot of retailers say, 'The DDA brings people into downtown but it's always for free.'"

"That's the DDA's job: To bring people here. It's up to the Downtown Farmington Business Association to keep the people coming back."

Hills Mayor Aldo Vagnosi said the issue was one of home rule.

"We are always hearing how the state doesn't want the federal government telling it what to do and how to run things," he said. "Now they (state) want to tell us how to run things."

Honigman said the bill not only makes exceptions for paid-on-call firefighters as a practical matter, but now in its final form exclude some elected officials, city managers and others. And the agreement would not affect contracts already negotiated.

"It would take effect in those cases after the

contract had run out," he said.

State Rep. Jan Dolan, R-Farmington Hills, was unequivocal in her opposition to the bill.

"I don't think it's the state's business," she said. "I'm certainly going to work against it. Maybe that's because I've worked in local government. I think it's hypocritical for the state to complain about the federal government telling them how to run the state and then turning around and doing the same to us."

The bill would likely not take effect until at least April 1, 1997, if it does pass.

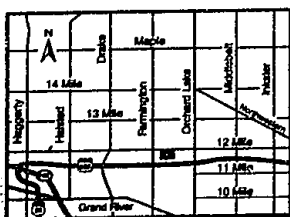

FARMINGTON PUBLIC SCHOOLS - PUBLIC NOTIFICATION TECHNICAL EDUCATION CURRICULUM 1995-96

Each year the Farmington Public Schools offer Technical programs at Farmington (FHS), Harrison (HHS), North Farmington (NPHS) High School and at the Oakland Technical Center Southwest Campus (OTC-SW) in Walled Lake. Within the District a shuttle bus transports students from their high school to another building. No class time is lost. These programs are designed to prepare youth for a broad range of employment and continuing education opportunities. They are offered under the guidance of certified instructors, counselors and cooperative education coordinators. The curriculum is technologically up to date, the equipment is representative of the state of the art in business and industry and the laboratories are of optimum size appropriately designed. If a program is offered at OTC-SW and at the home high school, students are asked to enroll in the home high school for the first year and then transfer to OTC-SW for the advanced program during the second year. NP & HHS students leave at 7:30 a.m. and arrive at OTC-SW at 8:00 a.m. They leave OTC-SW at 10:15 and return to their home high school by 10:45 a.m. FHS students also leave at 7:30 but depart OTC-SW at 10:30 and return to FHS by 11:00 a.m. Listed below are the programs being offered this year, their location and their prerequisites.
