

Lutheran League has its golden anniversary

During the recent Lutheran Tournament at Thunderbowl Lane, a short ceremony commenced, presenting officers of the Westside Lutheran League with its 50-year plaque.

Representing the American Bowling Congress, Bob Wisniewski handed the inscribed memento to Warren Teubert of Redford — the league's only charter member.

Formed in 1946, Westside Lutheran League at Center Recreation. A year later it was split into separate leagues with the No. 1 division moving to Parkside Recreation and No. 2 to Center Recreation. The two leagues reunited later at Argyle Recreation.

During the 1963 season, they moved over to Redford Lane.

Over the lifespan, some records were established, such as 300 games from Jerry Wehler, Kevin Chambers and Don Johnson, who also holds the high series mark with 180. High single-game was Prince of Peace with 1,677, team high three was Our Shepherd at 3,124, and consecutive championships went to Holy Cross with five between 1962 and 1967.

Many of the current members are from Livonia and Redford. Others live in Westland, Farmington Hills, Canton, Plymouth, Rochester and West Bloomfield.

The current officers are President Dave Cornwell of Westland, Vice President Warren Teubert, Secretary Walter Morris of West Bloomfield and Treasurer Charles Becker.

The league has a tradition of 50 years of excellence with a lot of old people who have passed this way and left the league with a long tradition of sportsmanship and good fellowship. Many members have served the local bowling community as officers and directors of the Greater Detroit Bowling Association, contributing in many ways to the sport of bowling.

Someone had a second chance in the same night for a perfect game after getting the first 11 strikes in a game last month. It took place in the All-Star Bowlerettes at Livonia's Cloverlanes.

I arrived during the middle of the game and saw something was going on as the first two ladies on the E&M Maintenance squad each rolled seven strikes in seven frames. The leading bowler was up in the eighth, so I stopped by to watch. Charlene threw another strike, and teammate Tamika, bowling next, did likewise. Both struck again in the ninth so were perfect going into the final frame.

Charlene got the first two strikes, then left a split on her final shot giving her a 238. Undaunted, Tamika got up there and rolled three more solid strikes for a 300 game. For Tamika Churnoff of Farmington Hills it was her fifth perfect game.

I walked away to visit with some other bowlers, then as I was ready to leave, I stopped again at lanes 13 and 14 and looked up at the overhead scores. Tamika

had the first five strikes in the third game (17 in a row) and spared in the sixth and seventh while the same leadoff player Charlene was clean through seven.

I stayed right there and watched as she again fired a strike, then another in the ninth. Now Charlene Gerbaso-Korhala was faced with just second chance in two games for a perfect game. She was cool as could be and threw strikes 10 and 11, then turned around and said to me, "If you guys will be quiet, I mean needs to make her spare, so don't get her nervous."

She then got up and rolled her next strike, making good on her second chance at 300 and an 813 series.

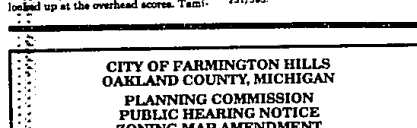

on Emerson to lead the attack with her powerful hitting.

"Henry Ford is a very strong hitting team," Spengler said. "We know their strength was offense and defense was their weakness. They had trouble passing and, without passes, it's hard to utilize those big hitters."

"We were serving to the right-back position, which is a hard pass in general. So, if the opponent isn't a strong passing team, that's where you want to serve it."

The Marlins served 16 aces in the final match — nine in the first game and seven in the second.

Ford seemed to give Mercy plenty of help with passing and spiking error, being unable to return many serves or organize its offense. The Trojans missed six serves in the second game alone.

"We've played Mercy before,

but we were a little apprehensive and stopped doing the things we've done," Ford coach James Walls said. "We stopped serving the ball, and that affected the whole aspect of our game."

"Our serves took us out of an offensive mode, and we had to play defense the whole time. We were never on the attack."

Mercy took charge in the opener with four straight service points by Lindsey Elton for a 5-1 lead. Kathy August, Emerson, Sheyenne Mooter and Erin Mousg added two aces to make it 13-2 before Elton and August closed the door.

The Trojans jumped in front 3-0 in the second game, but Mercy soon caught up and forged ahead.

Emerson's block made it 4-3, and two aces each by August and Heidi Wahl boosted the lead to 10-4. Mooter served the next four

points (two aces) and Anne Ward finished it.

"Our level of intensity went down after the first match," Ford coach James Walls said of a 15-8, 15-2 win over Berkeley, which had beaten Southfield 15-13, 15-4 to start the tournament.

"The first (match) was maybe too easy, and we weren't in the proper mode and thought we were going to take them too easily. When we woke up, it was too late, and Mercy is too good."

The Marlins also had to be prepared for a possible fourth straight meeting with Berkeley, a strong defensive team, in the finals, according to Spengler. But two weeks of preparation had them ready for anything.

"We were third at the U-M Dearborn tournament and kept the momentum up and focused on the district," Spengler said. "We came in on an emotional high and just rolled with it. We spent two weeks building to this weekend."

"We're at our peak right now across the board, no one had a bad match. James has been very on, and we tried to get the ball to her as much as possible."

Mercy will play the host Eagles at 11 a.m. Saturday in the regional tournament at Farmdale, Plymouth.

Salem and Livonia Ladywood meet at 12:30 p.m. with the final to follow that match.

"The Catholic League is extremely strong, and the top teams in the Central Division are always strong contenders in the district regional," Spengler said. Mercy was third in the league.

"That's great preparation. It's hard to lose during the season, but it is great preparation."
