and Lahser roads.

Beginning in prekindergarten, the program develops the child's natural curiosity and abilities at a pace which provides encouragement and nurtures self-esteem. As the student progresses through the school, requirements become more challenging in all areas and students expand critical thinking and learn decision-making and problem-solving skills.

Academic excellence is foremost at Country Day, combining with the arts, athletics and activities. The school offers the prestigious International Baccalaureate program and a wide range of Advanced Placement courses. Each year 100% of the graduates go on to college; last year's class was accepted at 124 different colleges, with 71% accepted to colleges ranked as highly selective.

Country Day students regularly receive top honors in national and state scholastic competitions. This year the debate team won the Class B state championship, two students earned perfect scores on the National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test and one senior is the only Michigan student selected as a finalist in the national Westinghouse Science Talent Search. In athletics, teams have won recent state championships in football, baseball, and both girls and boys lacrosse, soccer and tennis.

At Country Day, students find diversity and depth in academic programs, care and understanding from the faculty and a challenging camaraderic from fellow students. The result is a superior college preparatory education.
