WOMEN'S ISSUES

In honor of Women's History Month, Oakland Community College (OCC) Womencenter presents "From Inside: Voices of Institutionalized Women," at 8 p.m. Friday, March 8.

The free performance will be held in the coffeehouse of the J building on the college's Orchard Ridge Campus, 27055 Orchard Lake Road, just south of I-696 in Farmington Hills.

The hour-long production is a one-woman show, conceived and performed by Leah Ankeny, that addresses women's issues like motherhood, poverty, addiction, domestic violence and child abuse. It features monologues inspired by interviews with women who have spent time in jails, prisons, domestic abuse and runaway shelters, in-patient drug treatment centers, psychiatric wards and youth homes.

HEALTH FORUM

The Womencenter of Oakland Community College (OCC) and the Women's Resource Center and Health Services of Schoolcraft College are holding their 15th annual women's health conference on Saturday, March 30.

ELECTION SLATED

The election for two Oakland Community College trustees will take place on Monday, June 10. Board members for the five-campus college are elected on a non-partisan, at-large basis by voters living within the college district, an area that generally coincides with the boundaries of Oakland County.

The six-year term begins June 30, 1996 and ends June 30, 2002. Trustees are volunteers and are

not paid for their services.

Prospective candidates must file nominating petitions containing the signatures of no fewer than 50, nor more than 200, registered and qualified voters of the Oakland Community College District.

Petitions must be filed with Deanna J. Cable, deputy secretary for the 1996 board election, on or before 4 p.m., Monday, April 8, at the college's George A. Bee Administration Center, 2480 Oplyaks

Road, Bloomfield Hills. Candidates must also provide two copies of an Affidavit of Identity.
