Though a bit young for the role, her energy and insights into Opal's character make for rollicking good fun. Opal is your basic eccentric, with odd ideas about storing things. Sugar, for example, is in a Prince Albert can. Opal lives with a stray cat she has adopted in an old Victorian house that has seen better days. All sorts oglunk, from stuffed animals to bubcaps and used tea bags on a string adorn the walls. It's stuff you might call leftovers from a gorage sale.

Well, into this humble abode comes a shabby trio on the lam. It seems they have just narrowly excepted arrest for selling fake perfume. Opal befriends them, and they quickly see she is the ideal

pigeon for their next caper. Fortunately for Opal, this is a gang that can't shoot straight.

Their plota to knock off Opal keep failing, First, she just misses getting hit by a failing ceiling. A hit end run accident misses the target. Even poison ian't enough to knock off the indomitable Opal.

Something even more amazing occurs. After each attempt, one of the gang is wen over by the lovable Opal.

First to fall is Gloria, whom Opal offers her last 339 to buy a silnky dreas. Nancy Segal is very effective as the winsome but shallow Gloria, who wants to marry a millionaire or go to Hollywood, whichever occurs first. Meanwhile, she's trying to make an illicit buck.

Next, with a change of heart, is the group's alob, Sol Boso. Doug

Noel plays this loser to the hilt with great lines like, "I'm not a failure. I just haven't been suc-cessful yet." He ends up wanting to pull Opal's little red wagon. "Funny, I was thinking of killing Opal, now I'm thinking of marry-ing her. Usually, it's the other way around."

Lastly, the safeastic professor Bradford Winter, gives into Opal's charms after she makes excuses to the police after he tries to poison her. Marc Rosati gives a consistent and entertaining reading in the role of a drunken, one-lung professor with ideas of grandour.
