The purpose of this plan is to inventory the Housing and Community Development needs of low- and moderate-income persons in Farmington Hills.

In summary, the Five Year Strategic Plan has identified the following priority of housing needs:

1. Housing Rehabilitation - to maintain existing housing stock
2. Affordable Senior Citizen housing
3. Rental subsidy programs
4. First-time home buyer programs

good job of attacking. For whatever reason we failed to execute."

However, Wayne senior guard Jameel Wooden (24 points) hit his sixth triple of the game to make it 58-51 to open the final period, but during a 10-0 Lathrup spurt, Wayne committed four straight turnovers.

Grays' aerobic layup gave Lathrup a 69-58 lead with 5:11 to play. The Chargers then came up with a steal and Allison dunked off a Grays pass for a three-point advantage.

"I thought we outplayed them the first three quarters, but it seemed like in the fourth quarter we let our guard down," said Gues, whose pair of free throws cut the deficit to 63-61 with 3:39 left.

Lathrup then answered with six unanswered points, including a pair of Butler free throws with 1:54 remaining to clinch the victory.

"They (Lathrup) tried that trap once before (in the first half) and it seemed we walked right through it," said Gues, the Zebras' star guard who finished with 15 points and seven assists. "It was really hard to see when you'd take the ball to the corner."

"We had faced that before, but these guys were more mobile and quick, and their guards were tall, too. Once you'd get past somebody, then Butler came at me."

The 250-pound Butler, who was averaging only seven points, certainly made his presence known.

"We tried several different guys on him," Henry said. "He's most effective when the ball is

missed and it comes off to him. We had a difficult job of blocking him out."

Wayne had a total of 11 three-pointers, over half coming from Wooden, whose dandy outside shooting enabled Wayne to lead 17-13 after one quarter and 35-35 at halftime.

Johnson, a 6-2 senior forward, added 14 points and 10 rebounds. Lavelle Gues came off the bench to score eight, including two treys.

"Our scouting report said they shoot terrific from the outside," Henry said. "That's a good bull club. It plays good defense and runs a controlled offense."

"Our trap (1-3-1) made it tougher to try to skip a pass and we were looking to pick it off."

The victory by Lathrup put the Chargers in their first-over state final Saturday against Saginaw.

## Grays area: Point guard

Lorenzo Gues and Greg Grays are friends from playing AAU basketball together in the summer.

"Me and him are real competitive in practices and games," said Grays, Southfield-Lathrup star junior guard. "We play hard and laugh about it later."

Gues, Wayne Memorial's star junior guard, could hardly laugh about the fourth quarter of Friday's Class A boys basketball semifinal.

Lathrup outscored Wayne 26-12 in the fourth quarter to erase a four-point deficit and win 77-67 before 8,498 at Michigan State University's Breslin Center.

Lathrup's massive frontline of 6-foot-8 All-America Mike Chappell, 6-9 Reggie Butler and 6-5 Harold Allison keyed a half-court press that caused Wayne to commit six turnovers in the fourth quarter after committing 10 in the previous 24 minutes.

Lathrup outbounded the Zebras, 38-31. The Chargers' Big Three had 30 cars, including 17 on the offensive end.

Butler, a 250-pound wide body, grabbed a game-high 12 to go with 19 points. Chappell, headed for Duke, had 20 points and nine rebounds, while Allison added 13 points, nine rebounds and five blocks.

The Zebras had trouble boxing out the Chargers and even more trouble throwing over them on day's Class A boys basketball press.

"Our biggest guy is 6-4 (junior forward Richard Rashad) and their biggest guy is 6-9 and double his weight," said Gues, who finished with 16 points on 6-of-11 shooting (including two three-point shots).

Butler was averaging 6.8 points and 7.4 rebounds per game.

"When Reggie plays, we win; it's that simple," Chappell said. "If I can't get it, I try to keep it alive for my teammates."
