Hills to study expansion of cellular towers


The Farmington Hills City Council will take on the question of whether there should be more cellular phone towers in the city at a study session 6 p.m. tonight, Monday.
Members of the Cellular Tower Committee presented their report at the March 25 regular meeting.

The committee and city council members will discuss the report, the work of eight months, at the study session. There has been a moratorium on new tower construction since then.
In other action at the March 25 meeting, the city council:
■ Passed a resolution opposing Senate Bill 766 that would prohibit municipalities from establishing residential requirements for employees. The bill is a violation of home rule, and in Farmington Hills, the city's volunteer firefighters must travel from home to the station, which can be crucial to response times.
■ Approved borrowing \$204,000 from the city's interceptor fund to restore cuts for the city's DPW facility renovation and expansion. Mayor Aldo Vagnozzi said the

city received a better-than-expected interest rate that allowed it to save the money over time on the \$3 million bond issue for the expansion. The interceptor fund will be repaid with the savings.
■ Passed a resolution requesting the state to reimburse the city for the cost of May and June special elections to fill the 15th Senate District seat vacated by David Honigman. The election, ordered by Gov. John Engler, is estimated to cost Farmington Hills \$110,000, Vagnozzi said.

"Technology is great, but they have to learn to do basic things," said Carron Simon, who is a pediatric dentist. "... when you go to college, you have to learn to do some things on your own."
Cooking is about chemistry and math, Carron Simon added. She suggested those could be incorporated into use of a computer.
Kids won't have exposure to those skills, which are career paths for some chefs or seamstresses, Harwood said.
"Who is going to make our clothes? Are we going to send them overseas?" Harwood said.
Harwood said she's been trying to find out more about the curriculum revisions since hearing about it inadvertently from a teacher.
She wanted to attend one of the planning sessions, but was told it was a closed meeting.

REHABILITATING AFTER INJURY
Treatment and rehabilitation are no longer thought of as two distinct phases of sports-injury management. Instead, they are now implemented concurrently. In fact, the primary predictor of injury is previous injury. As long as the rehabilitation is oriented toward restoring sports readiness and not simply relieving symptoms, rehabilitation can break an athlete's injury/reinjury cycle and restore him or her to peak performance.
Physical therapy is a form of health care that prevents, identifies, corrects, and alleviates dysfunction of anatomic or physiologic origin.
