By then, with a bachelor's degree in engineering and a master's degree in business administration from the University of Michigan, he had worked for Fard Motor Company as a product planner, and then owned two Midae muffler shops in downtown Farmington and Taylor.

"1979 was a major turning point for ms," said Nagler, who

spent the decade running his muffler business while pursuing photography as a hobby.

"I met Ansel Adams when I was accepted in his photography workshop in California. I approached the Observer about writing a column. I started teaching photography clauses at the Community House in Fermington (now Longacre House) and I began an affiliation with the Halstend Gallery in Birmingham."

"The fronting on the cake that year was winning the grand prize in the first annual Detroit News photography content for a picture of an old woman in Rome covering her face. The prize was three weeks in Spain.

"I am very proud of the Artist in Residence award," Nagler said. "The plaque hangs in my dork room. It has always meant a great deal to me.

"Betty Paine was my nominator. To pick a photographer over

Nagler has lived in Farmington
Hills for 12 years. For his work, he
has traveled to Russia, China,
Korca, remote northern Canada
and all over Europe.
