Upon my return to work, I was informed that this week's annual fishing trip in southern Loke Huron to preview the River Crab Salmon Stakes Pishing Tournament had been postponed a week. The trip begins in St. Clair and there is too much ice flowing down the St. Clair River right now to even get the boats in the water.

When the warm weather finally sets in, and I'm sure It will soon, fishing across the state will improve dramatically.

About the only ones experiencing any success right now are the steelhead anglers, although the spring runs have yet to material-

ize. A few days of warm, sunny weather coupled with a nice warm rainfall and the river water will begin to warm, triggering those much anticipated spring spawn-lug ages.

Creel survey ongoing

Creel survey ongoing
Anglers heading out to the local
steelhead producing streams—
the Clinton River the Belle River
and Mill Creek — should watch
for stamped, self-addressed postcards on their windshelds.
Steelhead anglers on these
three southern Michigan streams
are being asked to participate in a
creel survey, which is being conducted by the Michigan Department of Naturel Resources.
Between 12,000 and 15,000
steelhead are stocked annually
into each of those streams, but
the DNR has no means of evalu-

ating the return rate of the fish, which is where the creel survey plays an important role.

A creel survey gathers information from anglers fishing a specificarea. The postcards ask questions dealing with the number of anglers in a party and the number and species of fish caught. Through careful examination of such information, fisheries biologists can determine if their management efforts are working.

gists can determine if their man-agement efforts are working.
"We currently do not have any data to evaluate the return rate of steelhead stocked in these rivers." explained Gary Towns, DNR southeastern Michigan fisheries supervisor. This survey will help us plan future management ef-forts for these rivers, and may show a need to increase or main-tain stocking levels."
Members of the Clinton Valley,

Challenge and Paul H. Young chapters of Trout Unlimited, along with local steelhead anglers are assisting the DNR in the creel survey and distributing the post-

survey and distributing the post-cards.
"This low-cost study could not be done without the support of lo-cal fishing clubs and volunteers," added Towns. "We appreciate the efforts of everyone involved."
