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## **Police finger** vandal suspects, no arrests yet

BYAIF WRITER Farmington Hills police have two suspects un-der investigation in connection with the vandal-ism of several houses, cars and a Century 21 office in the northern part of the city. No one has yet to be streated.

"This looks like gang graffiti, with the inverted sweatikas," and Detective Lt. Doug Anderson. "I don't think this was an ethnic intimidation prob-lem. We think these were kids out on spring iverki."

Anderson was talking about the spray painting of the swasticss and "S.B." symbols found on sev-eral mail boxes, e car and four houses on East-field, north of 13 Mile. The symbols were also spray painted on a picnic table and the porch at the Century 21 building nearby on Orchard Lette.
