SPECIAL OLYMPICS
Alumni, players and coaching staffs from the Michigan State Spartans and the University of Michigan Wolverines will team up to raise money for the Oakland County Special Olympics on May 6.
The fifth annual Make 'N' Green Tournament, which is ex-

pected to raise \$50,000 for athletes with mental retardation, will be held at Oakland Hills Country Club in Bloomfield Township.
A continental breakfast begins at 9:45 a.m., followed by a shotgun start at 11 a.m. Awards will be presented from 4-6 p.m.
Although both universities are "winners" for participating in the event, the "losing" university will receive a tournament trophy which must be displayed in a common traffic area so it can be viewed by everyone who crosses its path.
