ficers pulled a gun on him. Harison said. "He said, Go ahead and shoot me. A 15-year-old acqueintance of Cayce and another man who saw both defendants on the day and evening before the nurders both said Cayce had told them he had planned to "do some ditt."

"He (Cayce) said he needed to borrow a gas can," said the 16-year-old Hills boy who knew both defendants and with whose family Cayce had lived for about six months. The boy added that Davis and another man he did not recognize came to pick it up that day.

The day after the incident, the teen said Cayce told him he killed Mellissa Bovair and set the house on fire.

"He told me he had to suffocate Missy," the boy said.
Garen Ratiff, who had been friends with Cayce at movie theaters where they worked, testified that on the day of the murder he and Cayce had driven to Royal Oak where Cayce bought a pair of handcuffs.

They also drove to a library so Ratliff could apply for a job. He saw Cayee reading a criminal justice book at a section about arson.


"He said he was going to do the library was all the

"He said he was going to do some dirt and burn up all the evidence," Ratliff said. "I told Davis (later), I hope you don't get involved in anything with Art (Cayce). He said he wouldn't."

But Ratliff testified that Davis had indeed gotten involved. Cayce told Ratliff after the incident that he had killed the two women. He had forced Melissa to perform oral sex on him, then used carbon monoxide from a car in the garage to make her unconscious, Ratliff Farmington Hills Detective Ronald Shankin said Davis told police in early January that he had been at the house and seen Cayce take the younger victim to the garage and saw him return with her "linny" body and thought she was dead.
Davis continued to "guard the hall" as Cayce had told

him, so that the mother could not escape, Shankin testified Davis had said. Davis also told police that he got a plastic gas container, helped load the stolen property into Cayce's car and divided it up with Cayce later that week at Davis' West and apartment, Shankin said. Fanego, in moving for dismissail of all charges against his client Davis, said that Cayce had told Rattliff, the juvenile and Harrison, "'I started the fire, I killed those women.' He never said use did anything."
"The only charge could be that he was an accessory after the fact of the larcenty or aron, Fanego said.
Judge Parker found that there was enough evidence that Davis had been at the murder scene, and that he had "sided and abbeted" in the murders so that he should be bound over.
Judge Barry Howard will hear the case in Circuit Court. An arraignment date will be set today. Both defendants are being held without bond in the Oakland County Jail.
