North posts soccer win

Senior Cooker Perkins scored three goals to lead North Farmington to a 3-2 victory over host Walled Lake Central in girls soccer Wednesday.

She broke a 2-2 tie and scored the winning kick with three minutes remaining on a penalty kick after being tripped in front of the opposing net.

The Vikings led 1-0 at halftime and rallied to tie 2-2 with five minutes left in the game. North goalie Meike Ziegler made several key saves late in the game, according to coach Tim Russell.

Kristen Kopacz had the lone assist. Perkins scored the other goal on a breakaway.

Kelley Wachberg played well in the midfield and won a lot of 50/50 balls, Russell said, and Natalie Heje turned in a solid effort on defense.

"One thing we did well was stay relaxed near the end of the game," Russell said. "In the Harrison game (1-0 loss), we got too excited and tried too hard to score a goal."

"We switched the field quite a bit, pulling the defense to the other side, and that helped us a lot. Of course, it's nice to have Cooker there finishing, too."

The Raiders, 1-2 in the Lakes Division and 3-4 overall, also defeated Southfield-Lathrup 7-0 on April 19.

Jodi Kahrnoff scored two goals in that game; Cathy Ricco, Perkins, Ziegler, Kopacz and Megan Kern tallied one apiece.

Ziegler played the first half in goal, and Erica Dyko and Jessica Glavak split time in the second half.

Livonia Churchill took a 3-0 halftime lead and defeated host Farmington 4-0 Wednesday.

The Falcons are 3-4 in the Western Lakes Activities Association and the same overall.

North pitcher Ks 17, Rockets



Behind a great pitching performance by sophomore Jeff Trzos, North Farmington defeated Lakes Division baseball power John Glenn for the first time since winning the WLA title four years ago.

Jeff Trzos was every bit the dominating baseball pitcher Friday when North Farmington defeated host Westland John Glenn for the first time in four years, 4-2.

The 6-foot-6 sophomore struck out 17 batters and threw a six-hitter as the Raiders improved to 6-1 overall and evened their Lakes Division record at 1-1.

Trzos, who walked one and hit one batter, also figured in 19 of the 21 outs.

In the second inning after Glenn had scored twice on three hits, the Rockets had a runner at third with no outs. On a passed ball, Trzos

came to the plate to make the putout, and he also fielded a ground ball in the seventh.

"He pitched a fantastic game," North coach Irv Horwitz said. "He really had it today."

"Glenn had three hits in a row, but he scattered the other three. He had real good control, especially with this cold weather."

"The other coach was very impressed with him, only being a sophomore."

The Raiders took a 3-0 lead in the second inning when John Lossaway hit a two-run triple and Dave Goselin added an RBI single. North led

4-0 after three.

Trzos also helped his cause by going 3-for-4 at bat. Eric Pierce had two hits, drove in the other run and scored another.

"It was exciting to beat John Glenn," Horwitz said. "Our kids came through with some hits and played great ball."

Steve Waller took the loss for the Rockets, 0-2 and 5-4. He gave up 10 hits but also struck out nine while walking just one.

Tim Reeves had a run-scoring triple and Tye Golden an RBI single for Glenn.

North nips Franklin

On Wednesday, the Raiders held on to edge visiting Livonia Franklin 6-4.

The Raiders led 4-0 after a three-run fifth inning but surrendered a pair of runs in each of the sixth and

seventh innings.

"Both teams had it and tried to give it away," Horwitz said. "We got lucky and pulled it out in the seventh."

With two out in the bottom of the seventh, Aaron Stephan drove in Trzos from second base with the winning run.

Stephan also hit a two-run triple in the fifth. Kirk Taylor had an RBI double and Tom Guellotte an RBI single for the Raiders, 3-1 in the WLA and 4-1 overall.

Taylor started and pitched five scoreless innings without getting the decision. He allowed four hits and had seven strikeouts but left the game because of a sore arm.

Ryan Weisman took over in the sixth and got the win despite giving up four runs (one earned). He

Farmington Harrison dominated the field events, hurdles and sprint Thursday, with the result being a crushing defeat of Plymouth Canton in boys track, 78-66.

If the visiting Chiefs had any hopes of an upset, the Hawks put an end to them by winning four of five events in the field.

Francis Catherman won the shot put (49.6), Dave Brodski the high jump (5-10), Jason Granger the long jump (20-6) and Travis Kelly the pole vault (18-0).

Harrison's Steve Catherman was a double winner in the hurdles, running the 110-meter high hurdles in a personal best of 15.7 and the 200 intermediate in 44.8.

Granger had four first places, which included victories in the 100 (10.9) and 200 (24.5) dashes.

He also anchored the winning 400 relay team, following Jamie Seale,

Keith Battle and Chris Knox to complete a 46.9 time.

The Hawks also won the 800 relay at Seale, Battle and Knox combined with Jerry Johnson for a 1:56.6 finish.

Harrison is 2-0 in the Western Division and 3-0 overall. Canton is 1-1 and 1-2.

"We were pretty pleased; we thought the meet would be closer than it was," Harrison coach John Reed said. "The kids are starting to gel, and we're right where we were

hoping to be at this point."

Jon Page and Evan Crockett had one individual victory apiece and helped the Chiefs win a pair of relays.

Page won the 400 run (54.2) and Crockett the 800 (2:12.2). Canton's Ian Bedford won the 1,600 run (4:39) and 3,200 (10:30).
