## Falcons suffer 1st loss

Farmington High had its four-game unbeaten streak snapped Friday when visiting Livonia Stevenson rallied in the last inning for an 8-4 victory.

The Falcons had a 4-3 lead going into the seventh, but the Spartans scored five runs off relief pitcher Brian Murray to win the game.

Stevenson's Tony Battillo went 3-for-4 with a two-run single in the seventh. Justin Kerr had two hits and three RBIs.

Nick Latra had a pair of doubles and one RBI for Farmington, and Dan McLaughlin also had two hits. Murray's two-run single gave the Falcons a 4-2 lead.

The Spartans took a 2-0 lead in the first inning, but the Falcons rallied with single runs in the third and fourth and two in the fifth.

Mike Anderson was the winning pitcher in relief of starter Mike Allison, who worked the first 4 1/3 innings. Charlie Jagger started and went five innings for Farmington.

The Falcons are 1-1 in the Lakes Division and 4-1 overall; the Spartans are 2-1 and 5-3.

## Latra wins 3rd in row

Farmington senior pitcher Nick Latra is making up for the time he missed last season.

Latra, who had a broken wrist and couldn't pitch at the start of his junior year, is 3-0 for the Falcons.

He struck out 13 and scattered five hits Wednesday as Farmington won its fourth straight game 8-4 over visiting Plymouth Canton.

Latra, who walked just two and allowed one earned run, helped his cause at the plate by going 2-for-3 with three RBIs and scoring a run.

"He didn't start out too well," Farmington coach Kevin Kinnaman said, adding he thought about pulling Latra after three innings with the Falcons trailing 4-1.

"But he certainly finished strong. He settled down and actually seemed to be throwing stronger in the fifth and sixth innings."

The Chiefs made contact early, getting their hits in the first three innings.

With the exception of the fifth when an error put a runner on base, Latra faced the minimum batters over the last four innings in which he had eight of his strikeouts.

In the Farmington fifth, Latra's fielder's choice drew in Wes Cornwell with the tying run.

Cornwell walked and moved up on a wild pitch and third strike. He beat the throw home on Latra's grounder to shortstop.

The Falcons broke the tie with a four-run sixth. Latra hit a two-run single and Chuck Archambault added an RBI single.

Archambault was 3-for-3, with a double and a solo homer, and three RBIs. Murray had two of Farmington's 11 hits.

Marc Hassard pitched the first five-plus innings and took the loss. Jason Bricker was 2-for-4 for the Chiefs.

## Warriors mercy Hawks

Farmington Harrison pitcher Matt Sullivan hadn't allowed an earned run in four previous starts, but Walled Lake Western caused the bubble to burst Friday.

The visiting Warriors scored seven runs in the second inning and eventually mercied the Hawks in five innings.

All seven runs were charged to Sullivan (3-2), who lasted 1 2/3 innings.

Western's Jason Brewer hit a grand slam in the fourth inning to give the Warriors an 11-5 lead. Western added four more in the fifth.

Mike Fisher had two of Harrison's six hits and three RBIs. He had a two-run single during a three-run first inning and got the Hawks within two (7-3) with an RBI single in the third.
