Hills home scene of 28th suicide



The assisted suicide debate came to Farmington Hills this week as Dr. Jack Kevorkian apparently helped a 53-year-old Canadian end his life in the Steele Street home of Janet Good.

Pras reports Wednesday said that Prass reports Wednesday said that Dr. Jack Keyorkian had attended his 28th assisted suicide "somewhere in Michigan." That somewhere turned out to be a brick ranch house on a pleasant street in northwest Farmington Hills.

It was the Steels Street residence of

Janet Good, an important player in the assisted suicide debate currently raging in the media and in Oakiand County Circuit Court.

Good — a right-to-die activist who has counseled many terminally-ill riends and who is herself terminally-ill with cancer — apparently allowed an assisted suicide to take place in her house Monday night, police said.

The victim was a 63-year-old Windsor, Ont. resident, Austin Bast-able, who suffered from multiple scie-

able, who suffered from muitiple scie-rosis.

Kevorkian, in the midst of his third trial for helping terminally-ill people die, was on hand for the suicide, ac-cording to police reports, as were four other physicians.

Hills Police Chief William Dwyer said his department was informed of the suicide by the Ontaric Provincial Police Wednesday morning. An un-dertaker from LaSaile, Ont., had con-tacted Canadian autherities.

The suicide apparently took place

about 10:30 p.m. Monday, Dwyer said, and the undertaker arrived at about 1:15 a.m. Tuesday to transport the body back to Canada for embalmi

the body seck to the body had been larged by LeSalle police and would probably be sent back to Michigan for an autopay.

Wednesday morning, police edidence technicians were looking through the Good house, while officers questioned Good and her husband Ray.
