# Salvadore Closing Joins Citizens

City of Farmington and Township residents joined together Monday night to ask the Farmington Township Board to do something about the closing of Salvadore to through traffic.

One city mother, who identified herself as a representative of a small but growing minority of subdivision residents, asked the township board:

"Can't you do something other than offer your sympathy?"

A township resident asked: "Is the barricade legal?"

SALVADORE, which connects Farmington Meadows subdivision at 8 Mile and Farmington Road and a section of Farmington township that has been pressing for road improvements for two years, was closed last week to through traffic. Closure was made by a six-foot high and 36-foot-long wooden fence stretching across the street.

Portions of the fence had been dismantled sometime over the weekend.

There is some question whether the fence is on county property.

"I expect that if the fence is on county property, it will be removed," said Farmington Township Supervisor Curtis H. Hall.

Hall said that he had contacted the Oakland County Road Commission but that he had received no word on the matter. Township Attorney Joseph T. Brennan said that the city could legally erect a fence because they had jurisdiction over their own streets.

Brennan said that under the township form of government a township could not ask the county road commission to rule on a matter concerning a city street.

"Cities rule their own streets," Brennan said.

THE MOTHER later told The Farmington Enterprise & Observer that her main objective was to have the barricade moved from county property, if it was on county property. She refused to identify herself.

"I realize that if it is removed from county property, the city can put it back on city property," she said.

"But then I'll at least be able to petition the city to have it removed."

In other township board action, permission was granted to Farmington Elks Lodge No. 1986 for a turkey shoot Nov. 3 on vacant 8 Mile property west of Middle Belt.

Permission was granted for this year only, with additional provisions that the area be thoroughly cleaned after the event and that a township auxiliary policeman be provided for traffic control, according to a resolution passed unanimously by the board.

The provisional resolution was passed after Sunnydale residents told the board of heavy traffic after last year's event and of litter left on the property.

The Farmington Township board moved to recommend that township architects draw contracts for furniture and fixtures for the township hall addition.

Hall said that the components recommended by the architect were less than the amount originally budgeted for the addition.

The cost for furniture and fixtures will be between \$15,000 and \$16,000, he said.

Township board approved preliminary site plans for the Camelot Court Subdivision park area (south of I-896 at Inkster), Williamsburg Convalescent Center (Middle Belt south of Eldred), and apartments on 12 Mile between Echo Valley apartments and Kendallwood apartments.

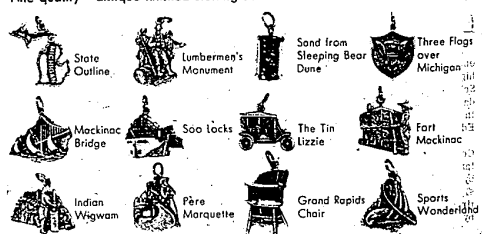
