### Tuesday Is Election Day:

## Ballot Lists Names, Proposals

The ballot in Tuesday's election is a long and complicated one with a variety of state and local propositions facing the voters in addition to the various offices.

Today The Enterprise & Observer prints a sample ballot so that you might study it before going to the polls.

The voting spots will be open at 7 a.m. Tuesday, Nov. 5, and close at 8 p.m. Under state law, all those standing in line at 8 p.m. will be permitted to vote.

Farmington Township Clerk Floyd Cairns predicted that about 85 per cent of the registered voters would turn out.

HEADING the ballot are the presidential nominees for the various parties

nominees for the various parties.

In addition to President, the voters will elect Congressional Representatives; State Representatives; and two members each to the State Board of Education; the University of Michigan Board of Regents; the Michigan State University Board of Trustees; and the Wayne State University Board of Governors.

Wayne State University Board of Governors.

Five state-wide proposals are also on the ballot. They concern the graduated income tax, daylight saving time, bonding to fight water pollution, a bonding proposal to finance public recreation facilities, and a proposal to permit the election of members of the legislature during their term of office to\_another state office.

Oakland County posts include County clerk, treasurer, prosecuting attorney, sheriff and drain commissioner.

DEADLINE for obtaining absortee ballots is 2 p.m. on Saturday, Nov. 2.

The Farmington City Clerk's office has announced that ballots may be obtained at the city hall from 8:30 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday or between the hours of 8:30 a.m. and 2 p.m. Saturday.

Township residents may obtain absentee ballots in the township hall. Hours of the clerk's office are 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Monday through Friday. The clerk's office will also be open from 8 a.m. to 2 p.m. on Saturday, Nov. 2.

A proposal to set up a county medical examiner system rather than the current coroner system also faces Oakland County voters.


IN THE CITY of Farmington, voters will be asked to approve a charter amendment revamping benefits for the city employees. In Farmington Township voters will elect three members of the Township Board. Two of the races are for full four-year terms, while one member will be elected to a two-year term to fill an unexpired term.

The candidates for the four-year terms are: Republicans 'Margaret Scheffer and Frederick Lichtman and Democrats William Hatton and Allen Sultan. Candidates for the two-year terms are: Republican Charles Williams and Democrat Joyce Hungerford.

The machines will be set so that you will vote for two peoples for the four-year term and one person for the two-year term.

On the non-partian ballot, for judges, voters will elect a State Supreme Court Justice, a judge for the State Court of Appeals and a District Judge for both city and township.

## State Elections Boss Apol Works Hard All Year, Every Year

politicians give out at election

Today Bernie Apol is Bernard J. Apol with an office in the new state Treasury Building looking out over the mail near the state capitol in Lansing, He's Mich-igan's Director of Elections.

He's a baseball fan, but elec-tions are still his No. 1 game. Some folks figure this is Apol's bury season, moving into the big election, the presidential elec-tion. He rankles a little bit over that,

"PEOPLE ASK: 'What do you do the rest of the year?' We work. They don't realize that elections

Apol, who had a bachelor's de-gree in economics and a master's degree in political science, was working og his doctorate at the University of Michigan when the elections division was established in 1952

The state decided to hire a graduate student from U-M and one from Michigan State University to be picked by the political science faculty of each school.

Apol was chosen from U-M and he hasn't had time since to comp-lete work on the doctorate nor

has he done any full time teaching. Here been too busy. The wo posts perhaps sound cut and dried but they were anything but, Apol described his role on the Apportionment Commission as "analyst, researche", mediator, and court jester when the tension got high."

APOL SUCCEEDED long-time Elections Director Robert M, Montgomery on Oct. 16, 1987, and one of his knottlest prob-lems to date was finding the right wording on the daylight saying time issue.

"I got a lot of suggestions,"
Apol said, laughing, "My wife
even gave me one: 'Are you in
favor of putting your kids to bed
in bright sunlight?'"
It's not quite that simple, though,

Of course, that was easier to wrestle with than a little old lady from Detroit who came to Lansing with what she felt was a major problem.

"SHE WAS ONLY about 5-feet tall and about 55 years old," Apol recalled, "She 'liked to come in and bend my ear and this one day I wann't listening after she'd gone on about an hour and I grunted 'Yes' when I apparently should have said 'No."
