## Township Board Awards Contracts For Water-Sewer

Four water and sewer system improvement contracts to-tailing \$521,136 have been awarded by the Farmington Township Board for separate township projects.

The contracts were awarded at a special board meeting Tuesday afternoon. Contract requirements did not allow the matter to be tabled to the regular Oct. 28 meeting, Supervisor Curtis H. Hall said.

Guymann Construction Co. was contracted for a new san-itary sewer system in Grand River Crest subdivision for \$338,970. The subdivision is bordered by Inkster and Colwell and by Grand River and Shia-wassee.

Individual property owners' assessments will be \$16.81 per front foot, Hall said.

lacobelli Construction Co.
was contracted for \$128,856
in new water systems for Holly
Hill Farms subdivision, Individual assessments will be \$984
per lot, Hall said.

"The Holly Hills assess-ments were done on a benefit basis," Hall said.

"The lots are odd-shaped and front-foot assessments would not be fair for every-one."

Iacobelli was awarded con-tracts for a \$40,860 water sys-


