Falcons edge Mustangs

Farmington overcame host Northville's late-game rally Wednesday to turn back the Mustangs in eight innings, 9-8.

The Falcons were cruising with an 8-3 lead heading into the bottom of the seventh inning when it started to rain.

That made it hard for pitcher Alana Heikkinen to handle the ball, according to Farmington coach Jerry Osborne, and Northville rallied to score five runs and tie the score.

In the top of the eighth, Farmington's Anna Clark walked and was sacrificed to second by Heikkinen. The Mustangs tried

to get Clark at second, but the result was an error that allowed Clark to take third.

Kristin Siskosky's sacrifice fly scored Clark, and Farmington blanked Northville in the last half of the eighth.

Heikkinen scattered six hits but walked 10, the most in her varsity career. She struck out seven.

The Falcons supported Heikkinen with 10 hits, however. Clark and Sarah Rattai had two hits and two RBI apiece.

Besides scoring the winning run, Clark had a big offensive day, which included a solo home run and a run-producing triple. She also walked twice, was hit by a pitch and scored four runs.

Siskosky also hit a two-run

single in the third inning as Farmington took a 4-0 lead, and Beth Hawald's two-run double put the Falcons in front 7-3 in the sixth. Doreen McLean hit a triple and scored a run.

"Defensively, we did a real good job," Osborne said. "The Mustangs put the ball in play, and we made a lot of good plays." Dina Ann stopped a run from scoring with a play at deep shortstop, and center fielder Teresa Lindenmuth's running catch in the bottom of the eighth took away a potential double.

"The whole key to us being successful, because we're not a real good hitting team, is our defense," Osborne said. "When we play good defense, we end up doing pretty well."

The Falcons are 6-5 overall.

Hawks lose slugfest

Farmington Harrison should have tried a long field goal or a three-point shot, coach Mike Tunchman said, after the host Hawks lost 21-19 Wednesday to Plymouth Salem.

The Hawks trailed 10-8 midway in the fifth inning but scored 10 runs in the bottom half to take the lead and make a game of it. But the Bucks responded with five runs in the sixth to win.

Harrison pitchers issued 13 walks; Salem pitchers walked 11 and also hit six batters. Jonny Trotter was the winner in relief of Shannon Coulton. Kristin Kozianka the loser in relief of Ali Ault.

Holly Foster was 3-for-4 for the Hawks with two RBI, and Abby Ault keyed the 10-run fifth with a three-run homer. Amy Rohle, Ari Ault and Megan Wild added two hits each. Wild had a two-run single and a solo homer. Ari Ault had three stolen bases and scored three runs.

Salem's Stefanie Volpe had six

RBI with a two-run homer, double, walk, groundout and fielder's choice.

Harrison is 3-7 overall, Salem 13-7. The Hawks are 2-7 in the league, the Rocks 9-1.

NOTICE OF PUBLIC HEARING
TO REVIEW THE 1996-97 PROPOSED BUDGET

The City Council of the City of Farmington will hold a public hearing at 8:00 p.m. on Monday, June 9, 1996, in the Council Chambers in City Hall, 23600 Liberty Street, Farmington, Michigan 48335 on the proposed 1996-97 budget.

The property tax millage rate proposed to be levied to support the proposed budget will be a subject of this hearing.

The 1996 proposed property tax levy includes 10.9974 mills (\$10.9974 per \$1,000 of Taxable Value) for city operations and charter limited debt service, 2.0626 mills (\$2.0626 per \$1,000 of Taxable Value) for unlimited debt service and 1.50 mills for road improvements, including debt service, for a total millage rate of 15.56 mills (\$15.56 per \$1,000 of Taxable Value).

The recommended 1996-97 budget will increase the cost of delivering city services this year. The cost of employee salaries and fringe benefits, and general inflationary increases in goods and services purchased by the city, and financing of the library and court systems, will increase the General Fund operating expenses on the 1996-97. Therefore, these values cannot be reduced to offset the increased cost of providing these services.

The public comments, oral or written, are welcome at the hearing on the proposed budget for FY 1996-97 and the proposed property tax millage rate. The proposed budget, as summarized below, will be on file in the office of the City Manager for public inspection.
