The Eccentric coverage area will once again be well-represented at the state tennis championships scheduled for May 31-June 1.

Birmingham Seaholm, Birmingham Brother Rice, Bloomfield Hills Lahser and Rochester Adams will compete in the Class A tournament at the Midland Community Tennis Center. The Class B finals will be held at Okemos High School.

The four A teams qualified by placing either first or second at their respective regional tournaments held last week.

Seaholm and Adams finished one-two at the tourney hosted by Troy High School. The Maples won with 26 points and the Highlanders were second with 18 points.

Lahser and Rice were first and second at the Birmingham Groves regional with 28 and 18 points, respectively.

The Knights, who suffered through a regular season filled with injuries, won all three doubles flights and two of the four singles flights to easily capture the Groves regional.

"What really made the difference for us is that we were healthy," said Lahser coach Jan Esper. "I kept saying all year that I have a good team if I could only get them all the kids together at one place at one time."

"They picked the right time to get healthy. I wanted to see them all play at their best for the regional," she said. "The kids really rose to the occasion and to

At No. 1, singles Dubin stopped Ben Salomon in three tough sets, 7-5, 5-7, 6-4, while Spors stopped Nic Salomon at No. 2, singles in straight sets, 6-4, 7-5.

Adams took the Nos. 3 and 4 singles flight crowns.

Mitch Byrnes stopped Craig Peizer of Seaholm, 3-6, 6-1, 6-0, while Kai Blasse won at No. 4 singles over Ross Morrow of Seaholm by identical 6-2 scores.

CLASS B TOURNAMENT: As usual, the Class B tournament hosted by Cranbrook Kingswood High School was as competitive as ever.

NOTICE OF INTENTION OF ENTERING INTO LIMITED TAX-SUPPORTED CONTRACT OF LEASE AND OF RIGHT TO PETITION FOR REFERENDUM THEREON

TO THE TAXPAYERS AND ELECTORS OF THE CITY OF LATHRUP VILLAGE, MICHIGAN:

PLEASE TAKE NOTICE that the City of Lathrup Village intends to approve and execute a Contract of Lease with the City of Lathrup Village Building Authority pursuant to Act No. 31, Public Acts of Michigan, 1948 (First Extra Session), as amended. Such Contract will provide, among other things, that said Building Authority will acquire, construct, furnish and equip additions and improvements to certain existing facilities known as the Municipal Building together with acquiring adjacent property and making site and parking improvements and all appurtenances and attachments thereto (together the "Improvements"), and WILL ISSUE ITS BONDS TO FINANCE THE ESTIMATED COST OF ACQUIRING AND CONSTRUCTING THE SAME FOR SAID CITY IN THE PRINCIPAL AMOUNT OF NOT TO EXCEED \$450,000. Said bonds will mature serially in not to exceed 20 annual installments, and will bear interest not exceeding 7% per annum on the outstanding principal balance or such higher rate as may be authorized by law.

The Contract will further provide that the City will lease said Improvements from said Building Authority and WILL PAY AS RENTAL TO SAID BUILDING AUTHORITY ALL SUMS NECESSARY TO RETIRE THE PRINCIPAL OF AND INTEREST ON SAID BONDS, TOGETHER WITH ALL COSTS OF OPERATING AND MAINTAINING SAID IMPROVEMENTS AND ALL COSTS of said Building Authority in connection therewith, regardless of whether the Improvements are tenable. The principal amount to be borrowed by the Building Authority will be indebtedness of the City for purposes of statutory, charter and constitutional debt limitations, and said principal amount, together with the City's rental obligation for payment thereof, may be increased to cover increased costs of the Improvements.

CITY CONTRACT OBLIGATION

BY VIRTUE OF SAID PROPOSED CONTRACT AND ACT, THE CITY'S REQUIRED PAYMENTS UNDER THE CONTRACT TO THE BUILDING AUTHORITY WILL BE LIMITED TAX FULL FAITH AND CREDIT GENERAL OBLIGATIONS OF THE CITY PAYABLE FROM ANY AVAILABLE FUNDS OF THE CITY, AND THE CITY WILL BE REQUIRED TO LEVY AD VALOREM TAXES ON ALL TAXABLE PROPERTY WITHIN ITS BOUNDARIES, TO THE EXTENT NECESSARY TO MAKE THE PAYMENTS REQUIRED TO RETIRE THE BONDS AND INTEREST THEREON, IF OTHER FUNDS FOR THAT PURPOSE ARE NOT AVAILABLE, AND AS LIMITED BY LAW. THE OBLIGATION TO LEVY TAXES IS LIMITED BY APPLICABLE CONSTITUTIONAL, CHARTER AND STATUTORY TAX RATE LIMITATIONS.

SAID PROPOSED CONTRACT SHALL BECOME EFFECTIVE WITHOUT VOTE OF THE ELECTORS OF THE CITY, AS PERMITTED BY LAW, UPON THE EXPIRATION OF 60 DAYS FOLLOWING THE DATE OF PUBLICATION OF THIS NOTICE, UNLESS A PETITION REQUESTING AN ELECTION ON THE QUESTION OF WHETHER SUCH CONTRACT SHOULD BE EFFECTIVE, IS FILED WITH THE CITY CLERK WITHIN 45 DAYS FROM THE DATE OF SUCH PUBLICATION. If such petition is so filed, the Contract shall not be effective without an approving vote by a majority of electors of the City voting on the question.
