Richard Lobenthal, director of the "Southfield-based AntiDefigmation League Michigan Regional Office since 1984, is retiring at the end of June."

He was president of the state's association of civil rights professionals and of metro Detroit's civil-rights coalition – the Coordinating Council on Hunnan Relations.

"Of course I'm ambivalent," Lobenthal said, "but I'm looking forward to the changes in my life. After 37 years with ADL, 32 of them here, it's time to do something else."

He has no specific plans.
"It just was time to move on to something else," he said. "Maybe I'll write a book. If you look at civil rights over the last 30 years, it's a fascinating story. When I came to Detroit, we were in a battle to pass a Fair Neighborhood Practices Ordinance, outlawing housing discrimination, and the referendum failed. Detroit supported housing discrimination! Look how far we've come since then," he said. "Three years later, we had the civil disturbance and I was a consultant to the Kerner Commission, which wrote the national report model was the report written in 1919 on the Chicago Race Riot. Nothing had changed in almost 50 years. The country, the state, southeastern Michigan, is just so much better off now."


