Salem coach needs surgery

Plymouth Salem baseball coach Dale Rumberger is facing surgery to remove one of his kidneys in the near future.

"My doctor said he knew it was serious when I told him I couldn't make the baseball game." Rumberger said May 28 after Salem defeated Livonia Churchill 10-2 without its coach in attendance.

Rumberger was hospitalized for two days with excruciating pain, but got out of St. Joseph Mercy Hospital in hopes of coaching his team that day. "By the time I got home." Rumberger said. "I was too pooped." Salem's highly regarded coach.

Salem's highly regarded coach had been living in pain recently but was hospitalized when it intensified. He originally thought it might be kidney

stones.

The doctor told me the other day, 'I've got good news - you don't have any kidney stones.

But your kidney has to come

But your kidney has to come out."

(Physicians take note: this was just Rumberger's way of making light of a serious situation.)

As the pain increased, Rumberger had begun making plans for others to coach Salem's team in his absence.

He called up JV coach Joe Bonnett to run the team along with assistant Mike Saneker.

"It was coaching by committee," Rumberger joked. If even got (former) coach John Graviin to come out of retirement.

After examination ruled out kidney stones, it was discovered Rumberger is suffering from a congenital kidney defect.

"After all these years," he said, "it's caught up with me. After two days in the hospital I got them to let me go. I wanted to coach the game but after I got home the pain was so bad I just couldn't do it.

"My other kidney is fine. It's kind of like a birth defect."

The way it was explained to Rumberger, the tube that drains the kidney is under sized and is causing the organ to balloon.

"I'm taking more pills right now than they make," Rumberger said.


