

DISCOVER GARDEN DELIGHTS AT MEADOW BROOK

The gardens are blooming in pro-fuse color where you can "Discover the Pleasures of Gardening" at the the Pleasures of Gardening at the fifth annual Outdoor Garden Show, sponsored by Meadow Brook Hall and the Metropolitan Detroit Landscape Association, at Oakland University's beautiful Meadow University's beautif Brook Hall, Rochester.

This exciting event will take place 10 a.m. to 8 p.m. Friday-Saturday, June 7-8, and 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. Sunday, June 9. Admission is \$7 per person, \$3 for children 6-12, free for these under 6. This year several new and innovative gardens will inspire visitors. Annuals and perennials, provided by Telly's Greenhouse, Troy, will fill a garden that incorporates a deck and a gazebo by Bidwell Construction, a gazebo by Bidwell Construction, Shelby Township. Unusual and artis-tic handcrafted hardwood birdhouses will be featured in another garden, landscaped by Mark Baldwin and Associates of Plymouth. The bird-houses are designed by the Art Harrison Interior Design Studio of Birmingham. A series of these temporary gardens will illustrate new ideas for the home landscaper.

A stroll through the woodland gar-den will take visitors through an Oriental garden and a "Wildlife Walk." Knoll Cettage, the playhouse Walk." Knoll Cottage, the playhouse modeled after the mansion, will be the setting for face painting and garden crafts for the youngsters. Now this year will be a miniature maze garden, and a small garden in the shape of a butterfly. Both of these new additions have been designed and constructed by Eaton Nursery Inc., West Bloomfield.

Dozens of exhibitors will be found in the Marketplace tent, where the latest in statuary, lighting, tools, furniture, planters, garden services, books and other products will satisfy the most discriminating buyer.

A series of speakers will present their programs during the show from a large deck situated on the grounds. They will speak at specific times so that attendees can schedule their visit to coincide with the ones they wish to hear.
