are carried from plant to plant by splashing water from overhead sprin-klers tend to "stay put" because, other than rainfall, there isn't splashing of water. This benefit is especially important when growing roses, zinnis, cucumbers and other flowers and vegetables whose foliage is susceptible to disease apread by spores carried by

The best way to explore the benefits of drip irrigation is by buying a kit that contains the various parts needed to install a complete system. and healthier soil conditions are simi-lar. Stone mulches are more expensive to buy, however, they last indefinitely compared to organic mulches that should be refreshed every other year because they quickly decompose when in contact with the soil.

Another maintenance saver: Instead of spreading mulch directly on the soil surface, first lay down a landscape fabric and then spread the mulch.

Such fabrics reduce maintenance even more because they block weeds from sprouting and add useful life to execute mulches by slowing decomposi-

wrong mix of sun, moisture, soil type, etc. A plant undergoing such a struggle is much more prone to be harmed by stress brought on by drought, insects and disease. Stressed plants are fragile and need a lot of work to keep them moderately healthy.
