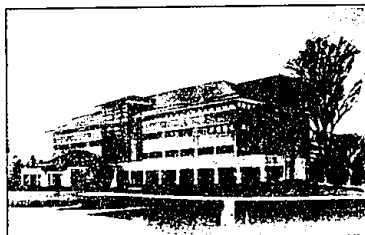

Manager search down to final 4

At long last, Farmington Hills will have an up-close look at its new city manager.

On Saturday and Sunday, the city council will interview the four finalists for the job vacated by Bill Costick after a 16-year stint with the city, 12 as city manager. Costick left in February for a job in the private sector.

So popular was the man, city officials renamed the Farmington Hills Activities Center on 11 Mile after Costick at his farewell party.

"I would rather go to a city where the outgoing city manager was well thought of," said James Prosser, city manager of Richfield, Minn. and one of the candidates.

The council plans to interview the five candidates and then pare down the field to two before conducting a final interview Sunday. A decision on the new city manager could come as early as Sunday evening.

"My hope is that we are able to make a decision by Sunday," said Councilman Jon Grant.

Richard Bennett, of the Boston firm the city hired to conduct a

search, recommended nine candidates. The council narrowed that field to six. Two of the candidates declined to interview.

Grant said he was not worried about Farmington Hills being able to attract top candidates.

"I think we're a community that would attract top candidates," he said.

And Richard King, city manager of Upper Arlington, Ohio agrees with Grant.

"We're a smaller version of Farmington Hills with some important distinctions," he said of the Columbus suburb. "It's (Farmington Hills) a very attractive upscale suburb."

Prosser said he had been in the area and accidentally wound up in Farmington Hills a few months ago.

"I was really impressed with Farmington Hills," he said. "I want to stay in the Midwest and I'm really impressed with that area."

The council will also interview Daniel Hobbs, the city manager of Greenbelt, Md., a Washington, D.C. suburb, and Mark Wollenweber, city manager of St. Clair Shores.

The interviews, which begin Saturday morning at 8:15 a.m., are open to the public.
