The world championships take place each June in Little Rock and is the largest single-style martial art tournament in the country with more than 4,000 competitors.

The ATA sunctions three national tournaments (including the world championships) and 84 regional events during the year. At every tournament, participants compete in forms and sparring competition, earning points for first 16, second (3) and third (1) places.

A competitor may compete in as many tournaments as he wishes, but only the best five regional tournament, one national and world championship points count toward a national ranking.

Antoniotti finished the year with an impressive 56 points, just six points out of fourth place. He will be an alternate for the Tournament of Champions in case one of the top four is unable to compete.

"With many divisions requiring 70 out of a perfect 90 points just to qualify for the top four, a competitor very often has to be the best in both categories of competition," ATA school owner Tim Halcomb said. "This reinforces the ATA's commitment to guide its students to be complete martial artists and not to focus on only one aspect of training."
