

The nine new police officers, all designated for uniformed street patrol, will allow the department to "be more proactive" in fighting crime, Dwyer

said.
"The officers will help the department promote high visibility and support community policing programs," the chief added.

Four of the new officers came from the Detroit Police Department. The longest serving is Mitchell Skazalski, who reached the rank of lieutenant during a 25-year Detroit career.
