Fireworks sale lands manager

in hot water

He had all the makings of an entrepreneur, but the product was hot: Not hot as in stolen, but as in

Farmington Hills police busted a 30-year-old man selling illegal fireworks out of his place of business July 3, after learning about the operation from a local doctor. A call was placed to the police department after a doctor at Botsford Hospital treated the patient who had injured himself with fireworks bought from an area car wash.
The seller, also the manager of the car wash, supposedly stocked Artillery Shell Assorted packages, Iwo Jima fireworks, Red Devil Maximum Blast, Starbursts and Black Widows just to name a few. The inventory topped \$2,600, police said. Undercover officers entered the car wash and purchased \$50 worth of merchandise. After receiving the fireworks, officers shut the man down.
He told officers he was selling the goods, which he did not know to be illegal, for a man in Romulus. A ticket was issued and the fireworks confiscated.
Police received a call from the Alcohol, Firearms and Tobacca agency saying the man was also selling M80s, 1/4 and 1/2 sticks of dynamite. Officers returned to the Grand River location, seprended the office and turned up the M80s.
The man denied possessing them or selling them.
