The Walled Lake Consolidated School District wants to sell a 12.2-acre parcel of land near Meadowbrook-12 Mile roads, considered not suitable to build a school. And at least two parties want to purchase the so-called "DNR property."

But the district isn't bent on simply unloading it, even if Commerce Townshord Officials might want that land to be part of its fledgling neighborhood parks system.

The Walled Lake District includes a northwest portion of Farmington Hills.

At the school board meeting, one residential developer's bid of \$168,000 was turned down. Meanwhile, resident

Charles Barson went on record stating that, if the property was still available, that he wanted to buy it and possibly build up to 11 large-sized lots on it.

"As a selfish resident," Barson said, "our best interests would be (served) if it remained in its undeveloped state... But if it is going to be developed, I want to buy it and I want to developed, I want to buy it and I want to develop it."

Probably the biggest reason for the board decision not to sell the land, located at the end of Oakside near Gittens Road, right now is the interest being shown by Commerce Township. At least one board

member appeared ready to back the township before supporting a builder.

"I'd personally like to see us hold the property," said vice-president Thomas McConnell. "I'd rather see it be sold to Commerce to use as a park than for new homes."

However, Commerce Township officials are not ready to make an offer, said schools Superinement James Geisler, and they probably won't be able to for several months.

The school chief said he recently met with Commerce Twp. Supervisor Thomas

WALLED LAKE SCHOOLS Long and with parks and recreation officials to discuss the subject.

"I commend them (Commerce officials) on planning," Geisler said after the meeting. "So, if they are about the business of making a parks plan, I think that's the right way to go" rather than to go about it hastily.

Geisler reiterated what he said during the meeting, that the sale of the parcel ian't an issue that will have serious rami-

"We're not talking about enough money to make or break our budget," Geisler explained. "The intention is to divest our-selves of it eventually."


