Chrzanowski said she was "amazed" with the "not recommended" rating since, "I am the only candidate who has trial experience."

The 16th judicial circuit court judge of Mount Clements said she neither completed the questionnaire nor attended the interview because she doesn't feel she needs endorsements to win the election.

"I got elected to the circuit court level at the age of 30," Chrzanowski said. "I had no endorsements, but the people."

Nichols said he was "very disappointed" with the determination. "In any conjecture they're

He added that he wouldn't sign the waiver of liability required by the committee. "I modified the questionnaire and sent it in because I didn't think it was appropriate, but it was non-debatable."

Moiseev's campaign manager Alan Feuer is a little surprised by the "qualified" rating, especially given the fact that she was rated "outstanding" just two years ago in her quest for district judge.

"I think the rating process is incredibly erratic," said Feuer. "In fact, it's not much of a rating

at all."

He questions the process and credibility of the "small group of people" who rated the candidates. He also points out that of the 11 women candidates, only one received above a "qualified" rating.

He does not expect the rank however to affect the campaign simply stating, "I believe the voters of Oakland County will appropriately ignore them."

O'Brien, however, said he was "very pleased with the rating. The part of the system we see is the application. There is a huge percentage we don't know in the extensive background (checks)."
