State board may urge districts adopt 'character education'

"Character education" — a stark necessity in a nation where kids run wild? or a move toward church-run public schools?"

The State Board of Education will take a one-month breather before deciding Aug. 21 whether to urge local school boards to implement character and citizenship development.

"We're not promising a panancea," said Bob Smith, a Livonia Kiwania member working with the Character Education Institute of San Antonio, Texas, on offering a character curriculum. "The overwhelming consensus is that values should be faught."

"These lessons should be taught in the home. But whether e like it or not, teachers are

ness, religious and other commu-nity representatives" to select values.

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"Include all religions, not just one," asid Holmes. "We also need to make sure that they are not the majority of the committee but that it is balanced."

Outside the board meeting, board president Clark Durant, R.Groscs Pointe, took the opposite approach, saying the Bible and the story of Moses could be used to teach values. And if the ACLU doesn't like it, Durant and, "well, let them sue."

John Duerr, a Warren father of three, warned the resolution will open "a Pandorn's box" and that "special interests are drooling" at the prospect of getting into character aducation. Kiwanian Smith, a former advertising man, volunteered his support of a curriculum designed by teachers in Character Education Institute. It lists a dozen values, including honor, honesty, truthfulness, generosity, kindness, justice and respect for others.

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Dr. Young Jay Mulkey, president of the institute, said it uses the tools of teaching critical thinking skills and building self-

esteem, teaching elementary kids to exercise self-discipline

Christie Enstrom, principal of Kalamazoo's Nothoast Elementary, warmly praised the program's results in that tough neighborhood. We don't have fights any more, 'she said. Good behavior is reinforced through cending postcards of praise to the parents.

Detroit educator Yvonne Roberts said Character Education Institute's program 'worked a change in the culture of the schools.' About 15 of the 42 buildings under her wing have used the curriculum. Beardmore noted the State Board would confine itself to recommending character education without endorsing a particular curriculum.

WELL QUALIFIED. To be rated Well Qualified, a candidate must possess many of the same qualifies necessary for the outstanding rating. This rating is intended for candidates who are clearly above—

QUALIFIED. To be rated Qualified, a candidate must possess sufficient qualifications from among the factors considered to enable the Committee to safely recommend the candidate to the public.
