NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that all noxious weeds growing on any land in the township of Farmington, county of Oakland, or within the limits of any highway passing by or through such lands must be cut down and destroyed on or before the 25th day of June A. D. 1911.


NOTICE IS ALSO HEREBY GIVEN that all brush growing within the limits of any highway passing by or through such lands must be cut down and removed on or before the 1st day of August A. D. 1911.

Failure to comply with this notice on or before the date mentioned or within ten days thereafter, shall make the parties so failing liable for the costs of cutting same, and an additional levy of ten per centum of such cost, to be levied and collected against the property in the same manner as other taxes are levied and collected.
