Jerry Ellis easily defeated Massic Kurzeja, but confessed that he really had no idea how well he'd do.

Ellis, an attorney and the city's Parks and Recreation Commission chairman, defeated Kurzeja by nearly a 21 vote for the city cuncil seat vacated by Mayor Aldo Vagnozzi.

'I really had no idea how this would go, said Ellis as he watched absentee ballot results that put him ahead by a 69-30 percent marpin.

Ellis lost some ground duving Tuesday's voting, but still wound up with 64 percent of the total vote. He won with 5,963 votes to 3,207 votes.

Kurzeja had been appointed in December of 1995 to serve on the council in place of Vagnozzi, who became the city's first elected mayor. A charter amendment called for an election at the first general primary or general regular fall election. Ellis will serve the remaining 15 months of Vagnozzi's original 4.

"I think the voters saw the two of us candidates side by side and had confidence in me," Ellis said. "The voters were not buffaloed because of

voters were not buffaloed because of who supported who or by the fact that the mayor and four council members supported Massic." Kurzeja, who matched Ellis in campaign spending, said had worked hard and done all she could

"I want to thank the 3,000-plus

"I want to thank the 3,000-plus smart voters who voted for me," she said. "I'm afraid that a lot of voters were confused and thought that the election would be in November."

Kurzeja said she wished Ellis well on the council and added that she wouldn't be going anywhere.
"I'm a 35-year resident, I've been active and I'll continue to be active," she said. "I'll be on the other side of the table. I just hope he (Ellis) can accomplish all he said he will.

Area voters cool to hot House race

Whether it was the hot, muggy weather, a political season that had turned nasty or just plain apathy. Tuesday's primary didn't bring voters out in purpher.

in numbers.
Election workers in Farmington and Farmington Hills were surprised at the low turnout. Only 22.69 percent of registored Farmington voters turned out. Only 24.61 percent of Farmington Hills voters cast ballots.

That was down from the 1994 primary when 30 percent of registered voters in Farmington cast billots and 35 percent voted in Farmington Hills.

"It's been slow," said a discouraged JoAnne McShane, who was trying to stay cool outside of Farmington's fifth precinct at Longacre Elementary School. This doesn't look good."

McShane, a supporter of Republican State House candidate Cathy Webb, knew something. Webb was defeated by Andrew Raczkowski.

Rep. Jan Dolan, also working for Webb, was fighting heat and frustration near the Farmingon shallots cast (29.9 percent) were absentees. In Farmington, 552 out of the 1,847 armington Hills, 6,233 of 12,660 (49.7 percent) were absentee ballots.
