Hills granted money to build storm pond

Farmington Hills will receive \$240,000 in grant money to build a storm water pond in Founders Sports Park on Eight Mile.

The money will come from the Transportation Enhancement Activity fund, which is authorized by the Intermodal Surface Transportation Efficiency Act (ISTEA). Of 75 of the 234 applicants received funding.

"This pond will enhance the park aesthetically, adding a quiet natural area, while lessening the impact of the runoff from Eight Mile Road," said Assistant City Manager Steve Brock.

The current amount of road water runoff will probably increase due to construction to widen Eight Mile to five lanes. The project will provide an area to hold the storm water and alleviate any downstream flooding.

The pond will include a filtering system that will clean the road runoff before it flows into the pond.

Pond construction is set for the spring of 1997 and should be complete by midsummer of 1997.
