# **Pioneer pastor**

## Spiritual need sends minister on Oaklandbased mission

The Rev. Rasfat Hanna left his

The Rev. Reafat Hanna left his native Egypt seven years ago to continuo his aducation in the United States. But once he discovered that there were no Arabic Presbyterian churches in Oakland County, Hanna found himself on a new mission.

'Arab Presbyterians had a hard time getting adjusted in American society, and they had to go to other denominations for worship,' recalled Hanna. They were looking for the same english in the same way they used to worship in their backgrounds.

Having just left a church he founded in Egypt 12 years before, Hanna again began the process of establishing a new church – only this time on for-

"In the very beginning, I felt my heart was still in Egypt," recalled Hanna, who makes his home in Troy with his wife, Wasfa, and children, Rhanda and Samir.

Today, the minister who put his education on hold to answer his new calling, view the experience in a different light.

"The Presbyterian church in Egypt was established by the Presbyterian Church of the USA 170 years ago," said Hanna.
"You established the church in Egypt, It's my turn to give some-

You established the church in Egypt, It's my turn to give some-thing back." In Egypt, the majority of the population is Muslim. And while some 18 percent are Christian, said Hanna, most are Coptic Orthodox.

Arabis outside the Arab nations, the Arabis Presbyterian Church is also in the minority.

When Hanna established the church in Troy with 11 charter members in 1989, it became the first and only one of its kind in the Presbytery of Detroit.

Two years ago, the fleedgling congregation took up residence at the First Presbyterian Church in Birmingham — a more central location for members who must travel from as far as Novi, Red-ford Township and Dearborn to worship as they did in their homelends of Egypt, Lebanon and Iraq.

We believe very much in spiritual worship to humble ourselves before God, "said Hanna, who conducts services in Arabic. Youth Sunday school classes are conducted in English for the new generation.

Bonded by culture, food, language and spirituality, church members join in monthly fellowship dinners and support each other as new immigrants.

The role is much more pronounced for Hanna, who has an office at the Birmingham church. Hanna reaches out to new mem-

ordice at the Birmingham church. Hanna reaches out to new members even before they arrive on American soil.

Dr. Samuel Rizk of Troy came to the United States in 1992 to practice internal medicine and seek new challenges.

"I came directly to Rev. Hanna. He was waiting for me at the airport," recalled Rizk, who learned of the new church while yet in Egypt.

Though the two men had never met, Hanna opened his home to Rizk, his wife, Noel, and the couple's two teenage children.

He also helped the family through the relocation process and job search. "He's a kind man, taking care

of his members regarding not only the spiritual aspects, but the social aspects as well," said

Rizk.

It was his parents, both church elders, who inspired Hanna to pursue Christian service.

"My dad and mom were a very good example for me, serving God and serving the church," recalled the minister of 19 years,

who says the Bible is his law.
"My mom taught me how we have to work as a family in the church. We have to serve the church in any need."
Today, he brings the same philosophy to his Arabic congrega-

tion.

Hanna has a bachelor's degree in theology from Evangelical Seminary in Egypt and intends to eventually pursue the advanced degree he has cluded for the last seven years.

For his growing congregation, he hopes to add an English ser-vice for the next generation. "Our goal is to be completely supportive," added Hanna. "In
