

# Fame requires time, effort

Anyone who attains the distinction of getting inducted to the Hall of Fame has "climbed that mountain" and should wear their honors with great pride. In bowling, there are local and national halls of fame, with a few others in between.

For our area, the Greater Detroit and Detroit Women's Bowling Associations are representative of the best of the best.

Those who get into the hall have earned their way with outstanding performances on the lanes over the course of many years.

The GDBA and DWBA hall of fame committees act with full consideration of all reports and resumes received, then discuss each candidate on merit.

The nominees are voted upon with a point system, and the winning candidates are then named.

The winners, unless deceased, are to be presented with their honors at the annual hall of fame banquet each November.

This year's inductees are Jack Treolar of Farmington Hills in the men's category and Dina Mann-Jones in the women's classification. Dale Savoy won the senior division; Free Press writer Matt Florio won in the

Meritorious Service category, following years truly, who received the same honor in 1990.

Additionally, the Tom McKay Award went to the late Steve Cruchon, who founded the Detroit Digest. The Judge John D. Watts Award was bestowed upon Mary Sanders.

Treolar is a perfect example of what it takes to make it to the Hall of Fame.

He is the only man in GDBA history to have won the Association tournament in every event. He captured the team event in 1968, doubles in 1968, singles in 1970, all-events in 1970; Masters in 1972.

Jack also has an ABC title (team all-events with Geobell Beer in 1974). He won the BJ singles 10-game total at Long Beach, Calif., in 1972, a Michigan team title in 1983, an all-events state title in 1974, four Michigan Majors (MIBA) titles and was elected to their Hall of Fame in 1982.

Treolar was a member of the first GDBA All-City team in 1964-65, 1967-68 (captain) and 1969-70.

He has rolled three 300 games and a 802 series and was Rookie of the Year in the All-Star Classic in the 1962-63 season. His highest average to date was 225.

There were many other worthy candidates in this category, all deserving of hall of fame consideration.

The quality of this year's candidates made the selections difficult.

## Stingers have strong finish

The Stingers, an 18-and-under girls softball team, finished the season with four victories, in 2001, to third place in the North Central Fastpitch League with a 10-10 record.

The team is comprised largely of Garden City, Farmington Hills, Mercy and Bedford Thurston high school players.

"This was by far the most grueling year I have coached; every game was a dogfight from the first pitch to the last out," Stingers co-coach Bob Smith said, adding the Stingers lost four games by two runs or less.

The other players are Dana Diekan, Leah Moeller and Shayla O'Mara of Mercy, Kelly McSweeney and Tami Welch of Thurston, Megan Hall and Heather McLean of Taylor Kennedy, Kendra Dumke of Dearborn and Shannon Coules of Plymouth Salem.

Stephanie Smith, who will play for Henry Ford Communi-

ty College next year, was named the team's most valuable player.

Melody Smith and Dumke shared the Best Award, which is given to the player(s) who contribute in ways not reflected by the scoreboard.

Smith played over pain and discomfort before having surgery to remove a tumor from a knee, according to coach Smith. Dumke, who batted .500 in the leadoff position, scored in all but four games over two seasons.

The defensive player of the year was second baseman Kelly Shanks, who will continue playing at Michigan State, and McSweeney was named the most improved player.

Ed Moeller served as co-coach of the Stingers.

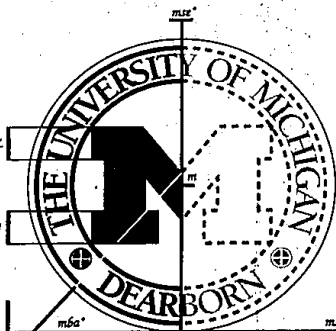
