"Run Oakland County like a business" is Ken Rogers' unoffi-

Appointed as a deputy county executive in Juno, Rogers plans to do just that. The former director of community and economic development easys he will follow the lead of County Executive L. Brooks Patterson by always keeping the bottom line in mind

"I'm a businessman who's come to government, and I like what I've seen of his style," said Rogers recently. "He's been an affective manager of the public trust. I'd like to think I could follow that kind of initiative."

Rogers, of Springfield Township, recalled Patterson's handling of a potentially disastrous economic crisis a few years back. In 1993, we discovered a \$24 million shortfall that would affect the county the next year. Instead of bonding that debt out, Mr. Patterson balanced the budget. He took numerous steps to

insure that it wouldn't fall on the backs of the public, and in the end, our bond rating went Finances and budgets are

up.
"Fiscal responsibility is what he has set in place and I intend to follow along that path."

But that will be no small responsibility. Oakland County is now officially the nation's fastest-growing county, with more than one million citizens and 40,000 businesses. How does Regers plan to keep this success going?

"By staying lean and mean," he said. "Oakland County has 4,000 employees, versus the city of Detroit, which has 17,000. I think those numbers show that we're preity efficient here."

"When I asked him to join the administration, I knew he was a talented gay," said Patterson recently. "But he scored home run after home run on projects. Every time I asked him to do something, it was done superbly. When I former deputy county executive) John Grubba retired, it was a tough call for me to

make, but Ken caught my eye."

Finances and budgets are nothing new to Rogers. Before working for the county, he was the co-owner of Evans and Associates, a successful real estate and development company, for 20 years. He founded Oakland County's Economic Development Corporation (EDC), and currently serves on the board of directors at St. Jaseph Mercy Haspitali IP Pottice. "Ken has been a valued member of our Divisional Board since his appointment in 1994," said Thomas Feurig, president of St. Joseph. "His expertise and perspective significantly contributes to our mission of bringing quality health care to the community."

"He was a major fund-raiser for United Way," said Jim Fisher, associate executive director of United Way of Oakland County, "He raised \$3.8 million for health and human services, an increase of 16 percent over the

previous year. In fact, Ken was responsible for the fifth largest growth in the campaign's 55-year history."

Despite the financial problems it will cause the county, Rogers seemed grauinely disappointed when the Detroit Lions

announced their intention to move out of the Pontiac Silverdome as soon as possible. There is a tremendous sense of loss. I don't think I'll ever forget the first time I sat down and watched a game there. (But) we can't have a stadium there if we don't have a football team. It's going to have to come down. It sits on a valuable piece of property.

But besides that pothole, he says that the only foresceable problem to the county's continued growth is simply running out of land. "We also have to recognize that Oakland County enjoys a very high quality of life. We have more golf holes per capita than any other county in America. The number-one indoor entertainment facility in the country is the Palace of Aubum Hills. The number-one outdoor facility is Pine Knob. If you want to fish, sail, ski, take a hike, travel on a river, camp, you name it, you can do it here.
