The Frankels of West Bloomfield, said Loss, "also brought their creativity, heart and time to this process."

West Bloomfield resident David Tisalae, who serves the congregation as president, was driving fore in seeing both temple projects to completion.

The Wing was begun in July and completed in 45 days by Stoneridge Construction Co. of Oak Park.

The project involved the transformation the 350-seat banquet hall to an elegant, 450-seat ballicom with three large chandeliers, tract lighting and a portable stage and dance floor. The hall will also serve as a sanctuary for parallel services during the upcoming High Holy Days of Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur.

Both the L'Dor V'Dor Generation to Generation Garden and the Herman and Barbara

Frankel Wing were created to provide spiritual inspiration by enhancing the physical environment at the temple at 5725 Walnut Lake Road.

"God's creativity and presence is around us wherever we are," said Loss.

"We've had the good fortune to have wonderful congregants, leadership and professionals that made this happen.
Our job is to infuse it with meaning."
